From the Director's Desk

From the Director's Desk

It is my privilege to present before you another eventful year 2017-18, wherein the National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development (NIPCCD), being an academic institution, continued to deliver quality systems in training and research in the areas of topical concern related to women and child development.



An autonomous organization under the aegis of the Ministry of Women and Child Development, Government of India, NIPCCD was established in the year 1966 under the Society Registration Act, 1860 in New Delhi. The Institute has set up four Regional Centres at Guwahati (1978), Bengaluru (1980), Lucknow (1982), and Indore (2001) to cater to region-specific requirements across the country. It has been functioning as an apex Institution for training of Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS) functionaries since 1975. The ICDS Scheme represents one of the world's largest and most unique programmes for early childhood care and development. The Institute, as a nodal resource agency, has also been entrusted with the responsibility of training and capacity-building of functionaries at the national- and regional-level under the new Integrated Child Protection Scheme (ICPS).

The Institute has two main constitutional bodies namely, the General Body and the Executive Council. While the General Body is responsible for formulating overall policies of the Institute, the Executive Council is responsible for management and administration of the Institute. Both these bodies have representation of government and voluntary organizations. The Minister of Women and Child Development, under whose administrative control the Institute is placed, is the President of the General Body. The President of the General Body is also the Chairperson of the Executive Council.

The objectives of the Institute are to: develop and promote voluntary action in social development; promote and develop relevant need-based programmes in pursuance of the National Policy for Children; evolve measures for coordination between governmental and voluntary action in social development; develop framework and perspective for organizing children's programmes through governmental and voluntary efforts; and establish liaison with international and regional agencies, research institutions, universities and technical bodies engaged in activities similar to those of the Institute.

The vision of the Institute is to emerge as an Institute of global repute in child rights, child protection and child development.

Important Activities during 2017-18

During the year 2017-18, the Institute organized a total of 392 training programmes which were attended by 12,892 participants. Of these, 259 programmes were organized on issues relating to Women and Child Development, including Child Protection and Juvenile Justice Act, and 133 training programmes for the functionaries of ICDS which were attended by 9,056 and 3,836 participants, respectively. Apart from this, the Institute also completed 17 research/evaluation studies /documents on important issues relating to women and child development. Training and research go hand in hand in the Institute's pursuit of academic excellence.

The Institute, during the year under report, functioned completely through e-office, thereby paving the way towards a paperless system and also for better accountability and transparency. The Institute continued to provide services

through the e-archive portal which was developed to make available various documents, research studies, training syllabi and other reference material pertaining to women and child development at one place. A total of 1780 documents had been uploaded on this E archive Portal during the year under report.

Besides, on e-learning portal, Job Training Course for CDPOs, Supervisors and AWWs have been uploaded and there are 405 active users, 545 registered users and 59 users have downloaded their Job Training course for CDPOs completion certificates.

Highlights of the Year

Important Activities

Ministry of Women & Child Development organized “Women of India Organic Festival 2017” at Dilli Haat from 1-15 October, 2017 to support and encourage women and women-led groups that promote organic farming, thus supporting their local community’s economy, creating jobs and keeping farmers thriving, in addition to spreading proper awareness about the benefits of organic products from all over India. The Women of India Festival of Organic Products was intended to highlight the health and environmental advantages of organic goods, provide a platform for women engaged in it and boost the development of sustainable and easily accessible sales outlets for women producers from the remotest corners of India. Women entrepreneurs from 25 States came together with their organic products such as cereals, rice, pulses, spices, cosmetics, household products, pickles, organic ice cream, oils, honey, tea, hair care, bath care, beauty care, aromatherapy products, solar products, kitchen composters, organic cotton fabric, linen, organic seeds and other bio products. The participants of Women of India Organic Festival 2017 also enrolled themselves in Mahila E-Haat, another initiative of the Ministry of Women & Child Development to meet the aspirations and needs of women entrepreneurs. This unique e-platform exponentially strengthens the socio-economic empowerment of women beyond the Festival. NIPCCD provided logistic support during the event.

The MWCD celebrated **Child Rights Week** with “**HAUSLA 2017**” between 16th to 20th November, 2017 by hosting an inter CCI Festival for the children who reside in Child Care Institutions (CCIs) with the aim that it would provide an occasion to showcase the talents and provide them with a space to express their dreams and aspirations. Children participated in various events like Bal Sansad, Painting Competition, Athletics Meet, Football and Chess Competition. More than 500 children from 26 States/UTs participated in the programme who had come from various child care institutions across the country. The scheme guidelines of Unnati for giving scholarships under National Children’s Fund to children of CCIs who show good academic performance were also released in the closing ceremony. A compilation of speeches written by children was also released. NIPCCD assisted MWCD in organizing the events.

Training Programmes

The Institute continued to extend its support towards capacity-building of stakeholders under the **Beti Bachao Beti Padhao Scheme (BBBP)** as well as imparting training programmes for Master Trainers implementing BBBP Scheme with a focus to improve the current statistics of declining child sex ratio, promote the importance of girl child, ensure her survival and protection and highlight the benefits of educating the girl child by providing them various opportunities to empower themselves. The Institute has also developed a training module and compendium to strengthen the capacity of ICDS functionaries and other related stakeholders in implementing the scheme. Module has been sent to all States/UTs. In all, six training programmes were organized on the theme till November, 2017.

A Preparation for Review cum Training Workshop for Beti Bachao Beti Padhao was organised by Headquarters with the main objectives to: sensitize and train the functionaries as catalysts for social change and to mobilize the community for its engagement for improving the CSR, Sex Ratio at Birth (SRB) and enrolment & retention of girl child in schools; provide information and training for better inter-sectoral and inter-institutional convergence at

district/block/grass-root levels through cross learning; and orient the trainers about planning process of advocacy campaign for social and behaviour change.

One-year **Advanced Diploma in Child Guidance and Counselling** commenced from 1 August, 2017 with the main objectives to: explore and evolve attitudes, values and beliefs that facilitates work with children as mental health professionals; acquire knowledge and understanding of theoretical constructs and socio-cultural perspectives in the context of counselling; develop skills to plan, provide and monitor counselling interventions for children and child-related systems; and develop skills of mobilizing resources and networking and collaborating with stakeholders.

Besides, a **Consultative Meet on Ensuring Safe and Secure Environment for Survival and Development of Girl Child** was organised by Regional Centre, Lucknow with the main objectives to: discuss the various existing strategies/models and points of convergent actions required for promotion of girl child survival.

Another **Training Programme on Ensuring Food Safety and Maintaining Food Safety Standards in Supplementary Nutrition in ICDS** was organised by Headquarters with the main objectives to: enable the participants to develop an understanding of safe food handling practices highlighting its importance in health and nutrition wellbeing; orient the participants to the food safety measures for SNP of ICDS; get an insight into food adulteration and the laws regulating the food safety; and discuss the role of ICDS functionaries in ensuring food safety at AWCs.

In addition to this, **Sensitization Training Programme on Japanese Encephalitis/Acute Encephalitis Syndrome for ICDS Functionaries** was also organized by Headquarters with the main objectives to: discuss the major causes, signs and symptoms, prevention and management of JE/AES; prepare action plans and micro planning procedures or combating JE/AES at various levels; apprise the participants about the new initiatives of MWCD; and discuss role and responsibilities of ICDS functionaries in prevention of JE/AES through community based management of underweight children and use of Mother and Child Protection Card as a tracking and preventive tool.

Apart from this, a number of **Parental Workshops on various Academic and Psycho-social Issues of Children** were organised by Institute's Headquarters and its Regional Centres with the main objectives to: sensitize parents about various psycho-social issues children face; make parents familiar with the nature of various problems in children; and develop parent's skill to play an active role in helping children to deal effectively with the various problems children face.

The Institute organized a **Capacity Building Programme for School Counsellors of Bhutan** with the main objectives to: discuss methods, types, techniques and processes of counselling; fine tune micro skills of counselling amongst the participants; enhance information of the participants on supportive approaches to counselling; and equip participants to effectively handle emotional fatigue.

The Institute organized five **Training of Trainers of Elected Women Representatives of Panchayati Raj** with the main objectives to: deliberate upon issues related to empowerment of women and functioning of PRIs; discuss schemes and legislations for women, children and other marginalized groups; describe processes of participatory planning in local governance; apprise significance of convergence and linkages to obtain better outcomes for development; and enable women to identify their own leadership potential to contribute effectively as change agents.

In order to build-up the capacity of functionaries associated with the implementation of One Stop Centre Scheme, the Institute's Headquarters organized Sixteen **Induction Training Programmes/Orientation Programmes for Functionaries of One Stop Centres** with the main objectives to: orient the participants on issues related to violence against women and constitutional and legal provisions thereof as also enhance their knowledge and skills in providing medico-legal and psycho-social support to aggrieved women.

Institute organized a **Workshop on Safety and Security of Girls in Schools** with the main objectives to: sensitize the participants on safety and security of school-going girls; share government and non-government initiatives for safety of school girls; discuss the role of stakeholders in prevention of violence and protection of school-going girls; and evolve strategies and interventions for ensuring safety of school girls.

In this series, a **Consultation Meet on Safety and Security of Women in Public Places** was also organised by Headquarters with the main objective to: discuss threats to safety and security of women in public places and its consequences; share best practices in ensuring safety and security of women in public places; discuss the role of various government agencies and voluntary organizations in prevention of crimes against women in public places; evolve strategies which will help in formulation of strategies to combat violence against women.

Besides this, several programmes on **gender equality, empowerment of women and girls, combating violence against women and girls including capacity building through leadership development** were organised at Headquarters with the main objectives to: provide insight on the policies, existing support services and legal safeguards for women and girls; develop an understanding about gender issues and overall development and empowerment needs of women and adolescent girls; discuss the scope and existing mechanism that foster leadership development among women and; understand the role of change agents in developing skills and capacities of women for taking up leadership roles.

Besides, a number of **Induction Training Programmes/Sensitization programmes for the Members of the Juvenile Justice Boards (JJBs)** were organised by Headquarters and its Regional Centres Lucknow and Bengaluru with the main objectives to: make participants aware about the situation of children in India in context of Child Rights; orient the participant about Juvenile Justice (Care & Protection) Act, 2015 and Rules, 2016 and various legislation and policies concerning to children; discuss role and responsibilities of JJB and other stakeholders under ICPS; enhance understanding on various psycho-social and emotional aspects of children; and develop strategies for effective implementation of Juvenile Justice (Care & Protection) Act, 2015 and Rules 2016.

The Protection of Children against Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act was passed on 19 June, 2012. Subsequently, after wide-ranging consultations among various stakeholders, the POCSO Rules were notified on 14 November, 2012 by the Ministry of Women and Child Development. Major stakeholders for implementing the Act are the Police/Special Juvenile Police Unit (SJPU), Judiciary, District Child Protection Unit (DCPU), Probation Officers, Counsellors, Child Care Institutions (CCIs) personnel, interpreters/translators, the medical fraternity, the community, family and relatives of the victim child and the child himself. The Central and State Governments are charged with the responsibility to create awareness about POCSO Act 2012. Keeping this in view, the Headquarters and Regional Centres, Bengaluru, Guwahati, Lucknow, and Indore organized a series of Sensitization Programmes/Orientation Workshops/Awareness Generation Camps on POCSO Act, 2012 and its Rules for stakeholders.

In addition to this, Institute's Headquarters and its Regional Centres, Bengaluru, Lucknow, and Guwahati organized several **Induction Training Programmes/Orientation Workshops on Child Rights and Child Protection for Magistrates/Chairperson and Members of CWCs** with the objectives to: develop understanding among the participants on the situation of children in India and challenges faced by children for their holistic development; sensitize and orient them to the Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act 2015; orient them about the functioning of CWCs and the role and responsibilities of Chairperson and Members of CWCs; create an understanding of the concept of rehabilitation and social reintegration and to enable effective assessment of options; discuss relevance of non-institutional services under the Act to facilitate effective rehabilitation and social reintegration of children including difficulties faced by them; and learn the role of different stakeholders as provided in the Act and to understand the mechanisms for speedy disposal of cases.

Apart from this, several **Refresher Courses for CDPOs/ACDPOs** were organized by Headquarters and its Regional Centres with the main objectives to: review the implementation of restructured and strengthened ICDS programme in the States with regard to various aspects; provide a forum for sharing of experiences in implementing the ICDS programme; apprise CDPOs/ACDPOs about the recent developments and trends in ICDS programme; update their knowledge in the areas of early childhood care and development including nutrition and health care; and sharpen their communication, counselling and managerial skills.

A number of **Job Training Courses for CDPOs/ACDPOs** were also organized by Institute's Headquarters and its Regional Centres with the main objectives to: orient the trainee CDPOs/ ACDPOs about ICDS Programme—its philosophy, objectives, package of services and beneficiaries with respect to restructured and strengthened ICDS and New WHO Child Growth Standards, MCP Card, schemes of SABLA and IGMSY; familiarize them with their role and responsibilities vis-a-vis job responsibilities of other block functionaries in coordination, supervision, and management of ICDS project; discuss with them the recent developments and thrusts in ICDS programme; share with them the need, importance and strategies for convergence of services at various levels of implementation; develop their requisite skills required for guiding grass roots level functionaries in preschool education, health & nutrition and community participation; and equip them with knowledge for effective leadership, supportive supervision and management of ICDS Projects.

Besides, various **Vertical Training Programmes of Block Level ICDS Functionaries for Quality Improvement in ICDS Programme** were organised by Headquarters and its Regional Centres with the main objectives to: enhance the skills of CDPOs and Supervisors to act as a Master Trainer for providing continuing education to AWWs at project level; provide inputs to improve knowledge and skills of all ICDS functionaries at project level for quality improvement in ICDS Services; and work jointly and formulate joint action plan at project level for quality improvement of delivery of ICDS services.

Apart from this, numerous **Skill Training Programmes in the areas of Social and Behaviour Change Communication (SBCC), Interpersonal Communication and Counselling, Early Childhood Care & Education (ECCE), Cognitive Development in Early Childhood years, Assessment of Child Learning Outcomes, Preparation of Teaching Learning Materials (TLMs)/ Teaching Aids** for ICDS functionaries were organized by the Institute's Headquarters and its Regional Centres Guwahati, Indore and Bengaluru with the main objectives to: acquaint the ICDS functionaries to the new developments in the field of ECCE including National ECCE Policy; familiarize the participants with the ECCE policy, the contextualized ECE curriculum and quality standards; orient them about assessment of child learning outcome and development; facilitate them to act as a planner and manager of ECCE including strengthening their skill in conducting various PSE and ECE activities; sensitize ICDS functionaries on the importance of the TLM in the Early Childhood Care and Development; and sensitize participants on the value of preparing TLM which are prepared from low cost/ no cost culturally available resources.

Training of **ICDS Functionaries on Implementation of ECCE Curriculum** was also organised by Headquarters with the main objectives to: review the implementation of Annual Contextualized ECCE Curriculum in the States; share the experiences of challenges faced by the States in implementation of the ECCE Curriculum; refresh the participants about the concept & importance of ECCE; make the participants understand about the philosophy, principles and components of the National ECCE Policy, curriculum framework and quality standards; familiarize the participants with the State specific ECE curriculum and roll out of the same in the AWCs; orient participants on the diversity issues and strategies to handle diversity in the classroom and assessment of children at AWC; develop skills of the participants to carry out execution of the daily/weekly lesson plans based on thematic approach; discuss about the possible solutions or strategies to meet the challenges and effectively roll out the annual contextualized curriculum.



Chapter 1

Training Programmes, Consultation Meets and Workshops

Food Safety Standards

Looking at the importance of Supplementary Nutrition Component under ICDS as one of the most significant interventions addressing child malnutrition in India, there is a dire need to develop a concrete quality assurance mechanism for the supplementary nutrition under ICDS to assess the food safety for ensuring its microbial quality and presence of food adulterants. In view of the fact that ICDS functionaries have a vital role in ensuring safety of supplementary nutrition at all levels of procurement, transport, handling, storage and distribution, a training programme on “**Ensuring Food Safety and Maintaining Food Safety Standards in Supplementary Nutrition in ICDS**” was organized by Institute's Headquarters and Regional Centre, Lucknow with the objectives to: enable the participants to develop an understanding of safe food handling practices highlighting its importance in health and nutrition wellbeing; orient the participants to the food safety measures for SNP of ICDS; get an insight into food adulteration and the laws regulating the food safety; discuss the role of ICDS functionaries in ensuring food safety at AWCs. The contents of course included: present scenario of food safety in India; concept of food safety and hygiene and its importance in SNP of ICDS; food-borne illnesses and their causes; food safety and interrelationship with malnutrition and infection; safe procurement and storage of food; safe food handling practices; personal hygiene and sanitation; water quality and purification; sources of nutrients and their conservation; value addition; food adulterants; laws and standards; and development of action plan including role of ICDS functionaries in ensuring food safety measures.

Japanese Encephalitis

Japanese Encephalitis (JE) is the leading viral cause of Acute Encephalitis Syndrome (AES) in Asia. The

disease primarily affects children under the age of 15 years. It is estimated that about 25 percent of affected children die and 32-40 percent of those who survive develop a long-term neurological disability (physical and mental impairment). Keeping in view the importance of prevention of JE, a **Sensitization Training Programme on Japanese Encephalitis/Acute Encephalitis Syndrome for ICDS Functionaries** was organized by Regional Centre, Lucknow with the main objectives to: discuss the major causes, signs and symptoms, prevention and management of JE/AES; prepare action plans and micro planning procedures for combating JE/AES at various levels; and discuss roles and responsibilities of various ICDS functionaries in prevention of JE/AES. The programme covered: understanding of current nutrition scenario of JE, its major causes, signs, symptoms and prevention and management strategies; action plans and micro planning procedures for combating AES at various levels; and main roles and responsibilities of ICDS functionaries and social mobilization techniques for its prevention. The workshop covered: understanding of current scenario of JE, its major causes, signs, symptoms and prevention and management strategies; action plans and micro planning procedures for combating AES at various levels; main roles and responsibilities of ICDS functionaries and social mobilization techniques for its prevention. It also covered the concept of SnehaShivir in prevention and control of JE/AES.

Swachh Evam Swasth Bachpan

The Swachh Bharat Abhiyan or Mission was launched on 2nd of October 2014, which is the largest programme on sanitation by Indian Government. The basic objective of the programme is to provide sanitation facilities to every family, including toilets, solid and liquid waste disposal systems, village cleanliness, and safe and adequate drinking water supply by 2nd October, 2019. It will be a befitting tribute to the Father of the Nation on

his 150th birth anniversary. Bal Swachhta Mission was also launched on 14th November, 2014 with an aim to support the Swachh Bharat Abhiyan (Clean India Campaign). The Anganwadi workers are the basic functionaries of the ICDS who run the anganwadi centres and their services include the health and nutrition of pregnant women, nursing mothers, and adolescent girl. They also play an important role in implementation of the ICDS scheme in coordination with the functionaries of the health, education, rural development and other departments connecting for health at the grassroots. Towards this objective, a deliberate and sustained advocacy is needed for enabling macro level policy convergence and close coordination between line departments to eradicate the scourge of child under-nutrition. Care of Children Under-Two

Today, undernutrition is still a leading cause of death of young children throughout the world. For infants and

children under the age of two, the consequences of under nutrition are particularly severe, often irreversible, and reach far into the future. Its manifestations including fetal growth restriction, stunting, wasting, and deficiency of essential vitamins and minerals along with sub-optimal breastfeeding adversely impacts child survival. This apart, Government of India has launched several schemes, all geared towards bringing down the under nutrition levels, including those impacting the MMR and IMR in the country. Keeping this in view, the Institute's Headquarters organized an Orientation Course on the Care of Children Under-Two for Functionaries of Voluntary Organizations running Government Programmes with the main objectives to: orient the participants on issues relating to health, nutrition and psycho-social development of children under-two; and equip them with necessary skills for dealing with issues relating to health, nutrition and psycho-social development of children under-two. The course broadly covered: an orientation to care for child's development; an overview of early childhood care and development—ECCE Policy and Curriculum Framework; nutritional care of children including an orientation to the New WHO Child Growth Standards; early childhood stimulation and pre-school education: concept and significance; developmental milestones and early detection of childhood disabilities; learning and behavioural problems among pre-school children; activities for promoting physical and motor development in children; activities for promoting language and cognitive development in children; activities for promoting socio-emotional development and creative expressions among children; community participation and resource mobilization for ECCD; and monitoring and evaluation of ECCD programmes.

Mother and Child Protection Card

Growth monitoring and protection of children from birth to five years, using the weight-for-age indicator, is one of the critical components of the ICDS programme. The MCPC is a maternal and child care entitlement card, a counselling and family empowerment tool, which would

ensure tracking of mother child cohort for health purposes. The MCPC would enable gender desegregated tracking, to ensure optimal care of the child. In order to enhance the capabilities of functionaries of MNGOs/FNGOs designated under Ministry of Health and Family Welfare for implementing RCH programme, Institute's Headquarters organized an **Orientation Programmes for Mother NGOs of Health Ministry on Growth Monitoring and Usage of Mother and Child Protection Card** with the main objectives to: orient the functionaries of MNGOs/FNGOs to the New WHO Child Growth Standards and the joint MCP Card; and equip them with necessary skills to use new WHO growth chart, and joint MCP card in ICDS. The contents of the courses broadly covered: nutritional and health status of women and children; policies, programmes and schemes for improving child survival and development; IYCF: an analysis of critical issues (advantages of breastfeeding, breastfeeding positions, correct attachment, breast engorgement, not enough milk, refusal to breastfeed, breast conditions, feeding during illness/ LBW babies, maternal nutrition, etc.); complementary feeding: foods to fill the nutrient gap; orientation to the MCP Card; introduction of New WHO Child Growth Standards: its evolution, concept and implication; steps in growth monitoring- determining the correct age of the child; accurate and safe weighing of infants and children; plotting the weight accurately on the growth chart of appropriate gender and interpreting the direction of growth curve including exercises on plotting and its interpretation; exercises on weight plotting and its interpretation; discussing the child's growth and follow-up action with the mother; role play on counselling mothers of underweight children; and an orientation to NRC and Sneha Shivir (community-based care for management of undernutrition).

Counselling Services

Family is the place where the children enjoy close bonds with their parents, siblings and relatives, where they receive unconditional love, care and nurturance and develop the endurance to face the challenges of life and

bloom to the best of their potential. However a sizeable number of children in our country may be deprived of this basic emotional care. Many of these are abandoned by the parents, orphaned by the fate or situations where parents are unable to discharge their parental responsibility on account of reasons like extreme poverty, ill health or disturbed mental states. Family disintegration caused by parental death, desertion, divorce, separation or abandonment may precipitate situations such as deviant socialization, truancy and vagrancy, bringing children onto the streets away from the family to fend for themselves. All such children are urgently in need of special care and protection. The Government has assumed the responsibility for care of destitute and orphaned children by creating of structure of institutions or 'Homes'. However, it is now widely accepted that psychosocial interventions that help to mitigate the effect of trauma, alleviating psychological distress, and strengthen resiliency must be an integral part of the care provided to children in distress to maintain or re-establish their normal development process. In this context the Institute's Headquarters organized a **Training Programme on Counselling Interventions for Children Affected by Trauma, Abuse and Neglect** with the main objectives to: raise the competency standards of the caregivers working in the 'Homes' for children and improve the quality of the psychosocial care being provided to the children; enable the participants to understand the linkages between neglect, abuse and trauma and its impact on the development of children; orient them to the various counselling interventions for addressing the psychosocial needs of children; provide opportunities for hands on training to sharpen the skills and attitudes for working with children; expose them to the field situations and innovative approaches being tried out in the field. The Course Content included: developing an appreciative understanding of the developmental needs of children in context of trauma, abuse and neglect; socialization issues of institutionalized children. The training also focused on developing skills in communicating with children, conducting core life skills such as negotiating solutions, assertiveness training, handling interpersonal relationships etc. This was coupled with strategies to facilitate the participants to deal with their own professional burnouts to work effectively with children.

Beti Bachao, Beti Padhao Scheme

The Hon'ble Prime Minister has launched the BBBP scheme on 22 January, 2015 at Panipat, Haryana through a national level media campaign and multi-sectoral action in 100 low CSR districts with objectives to improve CSR, promote the importance of Girl Child and highlight the benefit of educating the girl child. Initially the Scheme was launched in 100 critical districts and additional 61 Districts were added in 2016. With this backdrop, Regional Centres, Guwahati and Indore organized a series of Sensitization Programmes on Beti Bachao Beti Padhao (BBBP) for functionaries of Voluntary Organizations with the main objectives to: sensitize the representatives of NGOs to prevent gender biased sex selective elimination, existing Legislations and Acts; make the participants aware about rights of the girl child and constitutional provisions; orient about ways and means of ensure survival, education, participation & protection of the girl child through coordinated efforts of Govt. and Non-Governmental Organizations; enable them to mobilize the community people for improvement in the child sex ratio (CSR). The contents of the course broadly covered: situational analysis of women and children in India, status of girl child, Constitutional Provisions including child rights including Right to Information Act 2005; Introduction to the Pre-Conception & Pre-Natal Diagnostic Techniques (Prohibition of Sex Selection) Act, 1994 (PC&PNDT Act 1994), Act & laws related to safety; gender based violence; marriage and adoption; right to education; coordination & convergence of services for survival and development of girl child and community mobilization etc.

Parental Education Workshops

Parenting is a natural instinct among all human beings. The pattern of parenting is mostly decided by the values, beliefs and practices of a society. Although it comes “naturally” and all parents make efforts to rear their children well, yet, in many situations the parents are not able to provide the required support to the children. Confused and inappropriate parenting can affect not just a child’s formative years, but also their later lives. In order to equip the parents with necessary information for enhancing their parenting skills, particularly in dealing with children with behavioural problems, learning disabilities, crisis period during adolescence, there is a need for providing a forum to the parents to discuss some common concerns pertaining to child care and development. Keeping this in view, Institute's Headquarters and Regional Centres, Guwahati and Indore organized several **Parental Education Workshops** with the objectives to: create a forum for

parents to discuss shared concerns related to challenges of growing up; and facilitate them to explore attitudes and skills to address psycho-sexual concerns of adolescents. The content covered: problems of high school children relating to school performance; role of parents in managing adolescents; supporting children with learning and behavioural problems; support during early and late childhood; enhancing parenting skills; and scholastic, social, behavioural and emotional problems in children, etc.

Advanced Diploma in Child Guidance & Counseling

The Institute at its headquarters conducted the 13th Batch of Advanced Diploma in Child Guidance and Counseling from 01st August, 2017 to bridge the gap between trained professionals for undertaking guidance and counselling interventions with children and their families in different settings. The course has been designed to enable the learner to assess and plan preventive, promotive and therapeutic need-based and milieu specific mental health programmes in schools and communities with children and adolescents. Twenty post graduate students from the disciplines of psychology, social work, and child development were enrolled in this

Diploma course. The Diploma course is affiliated to Gobind Singh Indraprastha University, New Delhi and recognized by Rehabilitation Council of India. The students are educated in assessing the child for various disabilities, learning and developmental problems, trauma and abuse etc., on psychosocial functioning of the child; carrying out psychosocial interventions such as counselling, crises interventions, play therapy, environmental manipulation and working with child related systems across different settings that include schools, children institutions, hospitals, clinics etc.

Development of Children and Adolescents

Adolescents, defined by the United Nations as persons between the ages of 10 and 19 years and these account for 1.2 billion in the world population. Holistic development among adolescents includes cognitive, social, cultural, physical, emotional, psychological and spiritual dimensions of human development, which are integrally interwoven. Developmental tasks in adolescence includes achieving increased independence, adjusting to sexual maturation, establishing cooperative relationships with peers, preparing for meaningful vocation, establishing intimate relationships, developing a core set of values and beliefs and transition to adulthood. In meeting the challenges of the adolescence, the Education department has a major role to play in educating the adolescents about physical, psychological, nutrition and health issues. In view of the above, Regional Centre Guwahati organized an **Orientation Programme on Holistic Development of Adolescents for NGOs and Schools** functioning in Tea

Garden Areas with the main objectives to: orient the participants about physical and psychological changes during adolescence and challenges of adolescents; apprise the participants to reproductive health issues and nutritional needs of adolescents; and sensitize the participants about their role in healthy development of adolescents in schools. The Contents included: adolescent health in India; emerging issues and challenges; understanding adolescence; health and nutritional needs and problems among adolescents; STD/STI and other reproductive health issues of children, prevention, treatment and management of problems; role of officials of Education Department in healthy development of adolescents.

Prevention of Drug and Substance Abuse

Drugs or substance abuse are two interchangeably used terms referring to the harmful or hazardous use of psychoactive substances, including alcohol and illicit drugs. Apart from the physical and mental health of the individuals, there are associated misdeeds and often crimes, which are carried out by the drug and substance abusers. Sikkim, a small state in the Northeast is one of

the progressive and peaceful states of the country. However, of late the state is seriously affected by the drug menace, especially among the young population, which is increasing day by day. The problem has become a burning issue for the families, government and societies as well. Various government departments such as Social Welfare, Education, Health, etc. and the department of Home, as well as civil society organisations are working for prevention and control of drug addiction in the State. However, a strong bridge is required to strengthen the efforts of various department and civil societies to deal with the problem of substance and drug abuse. In this backdrop, Regional Centre, Guwahati organized a **Workshop for Stakeholders on Prevention of Drug and Substance Abuse** with the main objectives to: sensitise the stakeholders on consequences of drug and substance abuse; help them to find out ways and means of prevention and management of drug and substance abuse; and provide a forum for the stakeholders to strengthen coordination and the convergence among the stakeholders. Developmental, Learning and Behavioural Disorders

Learning disability and Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder are few of the commonly known developmental disorders reported at Child Guidance Clinics. Developmental disorders in children alter the

pathways of their development and the children are unable to meet many of the developmental tasks. Seemingly normal looking children are misunderstood and pressurized by misplaced expectations of their family and school. It is a known fact that parental involvement in intervention leads to better prognosis as it increases parental confidence in handling the difficulty. In this context, a **Sensitization Programme on Empowering Families with Children with Learning Disabilities and Autism Spectrum Disorder** was organized by Institute's Headquarters with the main objectives to: sensitize the practitioners and counsellors with the strategies that enhance parental resources to support their children with developmental disorders; enable the participants to understand the challenges of family with children having developmental disorders; orient the participants to effective assessment and counselling procedures to enable families to gain constructive perspective about the child and the disorder; critically apprise them with the strategies to empower families to identify and nurture strengths of the child; orient the families to the supportive interventions that strengthen resilience of the family unit through family support activities. The major components of the training programme included: theoretical constructs on understanding the family with in 'Systems' and 'Developmental Perspective'; and the parameters of healthy functioning families.

Child Mental Health

Mental health is defined as “the successful performance of mental function, resulting in productive activities, fulfilling relationships with other people, and the ability to adapt to change and to cope with adversity”. It is not only absence of mental illness but also the possession of skills necessary to cope with life’s challenges. Children’s mental health problem is linked to poor academic performance, behavior problems, school violence, dropping out, substance abuse, suicide, and criminal activity. It has to be noted that services provided for students with mental health issues are often fragmented in nature and there is a lack the collaboration among professionals from different disciplines. Also, the involvement of families in planning and implementing interventions and school wide approaches to support students’ emotional and behavioral needs is important therefore, it is necessary that school teachers develop an understanding of the mental health issues of students to be able to take necessary action for addressing these. Keeping this in view, Regional Centre Indore organized a **Sensitization Programme for School Officials of Western States on Mental Health of Children** with the main objectives to: help the school officials to understand the concept of mental health and their implications on children; familiarize the principals with the various mental health issues children face; and acquaint them with various intervention strategies to be adopted for managing mental health of children. The contents included : issues related to psychological well-being of children; identifying learning and common behavioural problems among children; address these issues with the help of parent teacher partnership; role of different stakeholders in promoting child mental health and various dimensions of counseling with specific reference to counseling in the institutions.

One Stop Centre Scheme

Violence is a major obstacle to welfare and development of women. Despite several efforts, the low rate of conviction in cases of VAW, as reflected in the National Crime Records Bureau annual statistics, clearly points out that besides the insufficiency of evidence, women generally do not associate with the trial proceedings. Women victims of violence are not provided due support at one place and they have to run pillar to post for various services and recording of offence. It is in this context, a need was felt to work towards strengthening the

institutional emergency response and support system, so as to effectively respond to the needs of the survivors of violence and prevent them from dropping out/withdrawing from the judicial process. The result has been the setting up of One Stop Centre (OSC) to assist the survivors of violence by providing full range of services and responses, including police and judicial responses, legal and health care services, psychosocial counselling and other support services. The Ministry of Women and Child Development (MWCD), has set up OSCs in one district of every State initially as a pilot activity to support women/girls affected by violence in private and public spaces, within the family, community and at the work place. Capacity building of functionaries associated with the implementation of One Stop Centre Scheme can effectively help in achieving the mandate of newly launched scheme of OSC. Keeping the above in view, the Institute's Headquarters organized fourteen **One-day Induction Training programmes for Functionaries of One Stop Centre at its Regional Centres, Lucknow, Bengaluru, Indore and Headquarters** with the objectives to: orient the participants on issues related to violence against women and constitutional and legal provisions thereof as also to enhance their knowledge and skills in providing medico-legal and psychosocial support to aggrieved women. The contents of the programme covered: an overview of violence against women in India; One Stop Centre (OSC) scheme and its components; constitutional provisions and legal safeguards for women affected by violence; medico-legal care to women affected by violence; support of law enforcement agencies to women affected by violence; Counselling and Psychosocial Support to women affected by violence; roles and responsibilities of different stakeholders and mechanisms to facilitate convergence at various levels in dealing with women affected by violence.

It is in this backdrop that the Institute's Headquarters organized a **Capacity Building Programme for School Counsellors of Bhutan** with the objectives to: orient the participants to the basic concept of counselling; discuss methods, types, techniques and process of counselling; fine tune micro skills of counselling among the participants; enhance information of the participants on supportive approaches to counsellor and to equip participants to effectively handle emotional fatigue. Gender Issues in Disaster Management

Disasters and related risks and vulnerabilities have social as well as physical dimensions. The Government of India has taken a series of significant all round initiatives, from the relief-centric outlook to a holistic perspective covering the entire cycle of disaster management encompassing prevention, mitigation, preparedness, response, relief and rehabilitation. As women and children are even more vulnerable in any disaster situation, the disaster risk reduction (prevention, mitigation and preparedness), response, and recovery initiatives need to examine differential impact of disasters on men and women and identify key issues to consider, and take action in all phases of disaster management. To build gender-sensitive strategies and initiatives in disaster management process, it is necessary to address the gender needs of both women and men during and after disasters. Government officials and Non-government organizations need to be well-versed with incorporating gender perspective in the overall planning and practices of disaster management. Keeping the above in view the Institute's Headquarters organized a **Workshop on Integrating Gender Issues in Disaster Management** with the objectives to:

develop a greater understanding of the differential impact of disasters and coping strategies on women/girls, men/boys; underscore the importance of gender analysis by focusing on consequences of seemingly gender sensitive interventions; identify key gender related issues to be considered in disaster management phases; and evolve strategies for integrating gender perspective in the overall planning of disaster management. The Workshop content included: basic concepts and construction of gender, looking at disaster through gender lens, gender based vulnerabilities and capacities, health and safety issues of women and men, gender based livelihood issues in disaster situations, gender issues in relief and rehabilitation, dealing with women sufferers of disasters, strategies for mainstreaming gender in disaster management, etc.

Training of Master Trainers of EWRs of Panchayati Raj Institutions

The 73rd Constitutional Amendment Act, 1992, was a landmark for women's political empowerment, mandating reservation in at least one-third of the seats of all Panchayat Councils and one-third of the Pradhan (Head of the Panchayat) positions for women. Numerically, today India can actually boast that there are more Elected Women Representatives (EWRs) than the rest of the world put together. The trend of data indicates that most often there are patriarchal forces that facilitate leadership for Elected Women Representatives. However, once they get the feel of leading and are supported in their political journey, these Elected Women Representatives have been known to assert themselves with greater confidence. It is with this conviction that Institute Headquarters and Regional Centre Bengaluru conducted a series of training programmes of newly Elected Women Representatives through their trained Master Trainers deputed from select government institutions. It is in this backdrop that

Institute's Headquarters and Regional centres, Bengaluru and Indore organised a series of **Training Programmes of Master Trainers of Elected Women Representatives of Panchayati Raj (EWRs)** with the objectives to: deliberate upon issues related to empowerment of women and functioning of PRIs; discuss schemes and legislations for women, children and other marginalized groups; describe processes of participatory planning in local governance; appraise significance of convergence and linkages to obtain better outcomes for development and enable women to identify their own leadership potential to contribute effectively as change agents. The content broadly covered details regarding Panchayati Raj System, roles and responsibilities of Elected Representatives, gender issues, Laws for Protection of the vulnerable, Government schemes and programmes, Participatory Planning, Public Works, Information Communication Technology, Leadership Skills etc.

Trafficking of Women and Children

Trafficking of women and children for sexual exploitation, bonded domestic labour, fraudulent marriages, sex tourism, organ trade, camel jockeying etc. is a growing scourge, an inhuman crime committed against the most helpless members of society. Trafficking clearly violates the fundamental right to a life of dignity, right to health and health care, liberty and security of person, and the right to freedom from torture, violence, cruelty or degrading treatment. The Government and non- governmental institutions can together play an important role in combating trafficking, rescue and rehabilitation of trafficked victims. Keeping this in view, the Institute's Headquarters and Regional Centre Guwahati and Lucknow organized three **Sensitization Programmes on Prevention of Trafficking of Women and Children** with the objectives to: familiarize the participants about the nature and magnitude of trafficking of women and children; impart knowledge on legal framework; familiarize them about the role of Governmental and NGOs to address the problem; evolve a strategy for prevention, protection and rehabilitation of woman/child survivors of trafficking; and analyze the role of NGOs in prevention of trafficking of women and children. Family Counselling Centres

In order to help couples with strained relations, marital discord and to provide the warring factions of the family a platform to discuss their problems and to find solutions, the scheme of Family Counselling Centres (FCCs) was launched by Government of India in 1983. It was found that majority of these counsellors often require additional professional training particularly on counselling by uniting families which were otherwise on the verge of collapse and helping the clients to resolve their disputes through a process of counselling. With this background, Regional Centers Guwahati Lucknow and Indore organized three **Orientation Training Programmes on Counselling Skills for Counsellors of Family Counselling Centres (FCCs)** with the main objectives to: appraise the participants about the dynamics of human behavior and linkages with social problems, atrocities against women; to orient and give them a wider exposure of the skills and techniques of counseling; to update the knowledge of relevant legislations and their implementation pertaining to women; and to develop their skill on record keeping, scientific reporting and documentation. The contents included: family system – issues, structure and changes,

family dynamics and family stresses, problems in Indian families and their social and emotional problems and their impact on family status of women, crisis management and methods of working with families, enhancing various skills of counselling, role of counsellors, various therapeutic interventions, dynamics of human organize, defence mechanism and abnormal psychology, activities for developing listening, empathy building, communication, coping, feelings etc., Atrocities on women, role and functions of police, legislations pertaining to women and problems in implementation of laws, customary laws, importance of methods of record keeping, scientific reporting and documentation. Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace

Women may face sexual harassment at some point of time in their work lives, making the work environment uncomfortable for women. The Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013 received the President's assent on

April 22, 2013. Monitoring and Evaluation

Since independence Government of India has launched a number of programmes of schemes for the development of children and women. Most of these schemes/programmes are implemented with the active participation of voluntary organizations. The success of implementation of any programme or scheme largely depends on effective monitoring and evaluation of these by the implementing agencies. However, it has been noted that despite this important component being inbuilt in many schemes, the implementing agencies mainly the voluntary organizations lack enough knowledge and skills on monitoring and evaluation. Keeping this in view the Institute organized two Orientation Courses for Functionaries of Voluntary Organisations on Monitoring and Evaluation of Developmental Programmes for Women and Children. The main objectives of the courses were to : orient the participants to the concept and importance of Monitoring and Evaluation in social developmental programmes; apprise them to the latest methods/techniques of

monitoring and evaluation of the programmes; and enhance their skills for quality monitoring and supervision of women and child development programmes. ICDS is a centrally sponsored scheme of Ministry of Women and Child Development (MWCD), Govt. of India, being implemented all over the country with the assistance of State Governments. In the State Monitoring Cell and office of the District Programme Officers and Child Development Programme Officers, Statistical Assistants are posted to assist the State level officers and DPOs/CDPOs in many States. Their role is to compile the information received from Supervisors/CDPOs/DPOs through the Monthly Progress Reports/Annual Status Reports at the Block/District/State level for further submission to the State Level Monitoring Cell/Central Monitoring Cell, Ministry of Women and Child Development, Govt. of India. One of the important functions and responsibility of Statistical Assistants is to check the accuracy and authenticity of the data received from the circle/project/district level. Since Statistical Assistants are required to collect,

compile and update the information, they need exclusive training on Management Information System but hardly any training programme has been scheduled for all the Statistical Assistants, NIPCCD being the apex body for training of ICDS functionaries, organized two **Orientation Courses on Management Information System for Statistical Assistants** with the objectives to: orient the participants on the revised MIS in ICDS; acquaint them of their role in the monitoring of achievements and goals; and equip them with skills in data management and analysis. In order to bridge the gap, Regional Centre, Guwahati organized a Workshop on Conceptualizing and Executing a Project for Functionaries of Voluntary Organisations with the main objectives to: enable the participants to develop a perspective on the need and importance of a project; enhance the knowledge of the participants in conceptualizing and executing a project; and develop skills in cost estimation and working out mechanisms for monitoring, evaluation and sustainability of a project etc. The contents broadly covered: voluntary action in India; current scenario; conceptualizing a project: key steps; execution of project; working out implementing strategies; networking, advocacy and monitoring plan; planning activities for the project; working out action

Child Protection and JJ System

POCSO Act, 2012

The Preamble to the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act, 2012 (POCSO Act) upholds the principles of the Constitution of India and International Law: The definition of sexual offences is broad and not restricted to rape. The Act protects children of both sexes from offences of sexual assault, sexual harassment, and pornography. The POCSO Act, 2012 is a comprehensive law and provides for establishment of Special Courts for speedy trial of such offences and for matters connected therewith or incidental thereto, while safeguarding the interests of the child at every stage of the judicial process by incorporating child-friendly mechanisms for reporting, recording of evidence, investigation and trial of offences. Recognizing that child victims of sexual assault are vulnerable, the Act puts in place special procedures to assist the child from the time of recording of his/her statement to the conclusion of the trial. The police have been given a huge role to play in ensuring the implementation of the child-friendly procedures laid down under the POCSO Act. The Act provides for some procedural guidelines! To be followed by the Police in relation to a child victim (any person below the age of 18 years) of a sexual offense under the POCSO Act and is a step forward in providing special procedures for children who are survivors of sexual violence. When dealing with a child victim of sexual abuse, the police must adopt a sensitive approach in order to meet the objects of the Act. The Act puts in place certain statutory obligations for sensitive handling of the child by the police. Keeping the above in view Institute's Headquarters and its Regional Centres organized a series of **Orientation Programmes/ Workshops/Awareness Camps on POCSO Act, 2012 for SJPUS/NGOs/ Elected Representatives of Panchayati Raj Institutions/ School Principals and Teachers/**

Counsellors/ Voluntary Organization/Medical Professional/ DCPOs and Functionaries of CCIs with the main objectives to: enhance the knowledge of the participants about salient features of POCSO Act and Rules, 2012 and the roles and responsibilities of various stakeholders, including police therein; discuss methods of handling cases of child sexual abuse; and discuss the problems in the implementation of the Act and skills to handle cases of child sexual abuse. The content included: Child rights: an overview with specific reference to rights of child victims of sexual offences/child survivors; salient features of the 'Protection of Children from Sexual Offences' (POCSO) Act and its Rules 2012; role of police officers in dealing with cases of child sexual abuse; understanding child sexual abuse, children's consequential Trauma and its impact on them.

JJ System

The Juvenile Justice Act, 2015 (JJ Act) provides a comprehensive legal framework for protection of children whether in need of care and protection (CNCP) or in conflict with law (CCL). In fact, reform and rehabilitation and not punishment are the guiding principle of the Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act, 2015. The JJ Act 2015 caters to the basic needs of children through proper care, protection, development, treatment, social re-integration, by adopting a child-friendly approach and disposal of matters in the best interest of children and for their rehabilitation through process provided and institutions and bodies established under the Act. Further, the Act also focuses on restorative justice practices that are different from criminal justice practice. Keeping the above in view, Institute's Headquarters and Regional Centre Indore organized two programmes on **Juvenile**

Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act, 2015 and Model Rules, 2016 with the main objectives to: enhance the knowledge of the participants about Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act, 2015 and Model Rules, 2016; discuss role and functions of other stakeholders under the act; share differential procedures to be followed in relation to children in conflict with law and in relation to children in need of care and protection and procedures to be followed in cases of offences against children. The functionaries of CCIs/ Open Shelters play a key primary role in maintaining the institution effectively and have the responsibility of being readily available as and when required by the children. Personnel of CCIs/ Open Shelters with the objectives to: orient the participants to develop an understanding of the needs of children in terms of their care and protection especially Child Psychology and related issues; facilitate them to identify and analyze the problems of children in need of care and protection and children in conflict with law; and prepare them to effectively deal with the children in a child-friendly way. In order to address the issues relating to child protection adequately and to provide a safe, secure and a protective environment for the children who are in difficult circumstances, the Ministry of Women and Child Development, Govt. of India has introduced a centrally sponsored scheme namely 'Integrated Child Protection Scheme (ICPS)' during the year 2009-10. The scheme has been revised in the year April, 2014. The District level functionaries working under ICDS have a crucial role to play for implementation of the ICPS at District level. In majority of the States, these officers have been entrusted the responsibility by concerned Nodal Departments to supervise the functionaries of District Child Protection Units. The functionaries working under ICPS at District level are recruited mainly on contractual basis. However, in some of the States, District Programme Officers of ICDS have been given additional charge to act as District Child Protection Officers. In addition, the functionaries working under Integrated Child Development Scheme such as DPO, CDPO and Anganwadi Workers have been involved as members in various committees set up at District, Block and Village Level to monitor the implementation of child protection services. These officers have not undergone any specific training from the Institute on child protection. In addition, it is also not known how these officers are supervising the functionaries of DCPUs and performing their job responsibilities as DCPO in their respective states.

Keeping the above in view, the Institute organized a **Workshop on Implementation of ICPS for District Level Functionaries of Integrated Child Development Scheme (ICDS)** at its Regional Centre, Indore with the objectives to: discuss about the present status of implementation of ICPS in the States; share the experiences about child protection and challenges faced; and evolve effective strategies and solutions for better implementation of ICPS at District level. Orientation Workshop on Adoption and Foster Care Guidelines for Chairpersons and Members of Child Welfare Committees

The Section 23 and chapter VII of Juvenile Justice Act, 2015 provides for the rehabilitation and social reintegration of a child in need of care and protection by means of i) adoption (ii) foster care (iii) sponsorship (iv) sending the child to an after-care organisation. CWC

shall determine legal status of all orphan, abandoned and surrendered children. Functions and powers of the Committee, procedure in relation to the Committee, production of child before committee, procedure for inquiry, procedure related to orphan and abandoned children and procedure related to surrendered children shall be governed as laid down in the Juvenile Justice Act, 2015 and its Model Rules, 2016. Further, The CWC has the authority to declare by order, whether the person is 'fit' and suitable as a foster care, before placing the child in foster care. For effective implementation of the Juvenile Justice Act and to provide family care to children in need of care role of Chairpersons and Members of Child Welfare Committees is very significant. In this direction it is necessary to provide training to Child Welfare Committees to enhance their knowledge and skills for dealing with children in need of care and protection. Keeping this in mind, Regional Centre Lucknow organized two **Orientation Workshops on Adoption and Foster Care Guidelines for Chairpersons and Members of Child Welfare Committees** with the objectives to: orient the participations regarding Adoption Regulations, 2016 and Foster Care Guidelines by Ministry of Women and Child Development; and discuss the role of CWC under Adoption and Foster Care. The contents of the workshop included: understanding children in need of care and protection; salient features of Juvenile Justice Act, 2015; Adoption Regulations, 2016 and Foster Care Guidelines; and role of CWC under Adoption and Foster Care.

The Integrated Child Protection Scheme is expected to significantly contribute to the realization of Government/State responsibility for creating a system

that will efficiently and effectively protect children. It is based on cardinal principles of "protection of child rights" and "best interest of the child". In order to ensure effective implementation of the ICPS, it is being implemented in mission mode by setting up State and District Child Protection Units as the fundamental units at State and District levels. The District Child Protection Unit at District level has a counsellor providing counselling services to children in conflict with law and children in need of care and protection as well as their parents and families. The counsellor also works with the CWC and JJB at district level as and when required. Hence, these Social Workers and Counsellors need comprehensive training on counselling skills to deal effectively with children in need of care and protection and children in conflict with law.

In this series, an **Induction Training for Counsellors/Social Workers of DCPUs** was organized by Regional Centre Lucknow with the objectives to: develop understanding among the participants about the situation of children in India and challenges faced by children for their holistic development; sensitize and orient participants to the Juvenile Justice Act 2015, & its Rule 2016 and ICPS; orient the participants about the functioning, roles and responsibilities of Social Workers and Counselors; understand and facilitate mechanisms for speedy disposal of cases; discuss the efficacy of institutional & non-institutional services under the Act; develop understanding of the concept of rehabilitation and social reintegration and to enable effective assessment of options in the best interest of children and; understand the role of different stakeholders under Act. Juvenile Justice Boards

The Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act, 2015 is the key legislation for juvenile justice in India. The Act emphasizes the rehabilitation and reintegration of children through various non-institutional and institutional measures. The major change in the 2015 Act is the segregation of children who have perpetrated heinous crimes. The Act vests the JJB with discretion to decide whether a child between 16-18 years accused of committing a heinous crime is to be tried in the adult criminal justice system as opposed to the juvenile justice system. The Act also provides for strengthened provisions for both children in need of care and protection and children in conflict with law. The fact however, remains that despite having a legal back-up system, juvenile justice system in India is facing certain problems which need to be addressed in order to make the system stronger, resilient and relevant. many such critical issues need to be brought into focus as far as the members of the Juvenile Justice Boards are concerned, particularly those who are new to their tasks of dealing with children so that their understanding and sensitivity towards children get enhanced. Keeping the above in view, Institute's Headquarters and Regional Centres Lucknow and Bengaluru organised a series of workshops/training programmes for capacity building

of members of Juvenile Justice Boards with the main objectives to: discuss the provisions of Juvenile Justice (Care and protection of Children) Act, 2015 and Rules thereunder; share the situation related to children in conflict with law in the States and; come out with effective strategies for implementation of JJ Act. The content of the workshop focused itself on the following aspects: issues and concerns related to child rights & protection; Juvenile justice (Care & Protection of Children) Act, 2015 and Model Rules, 2016; case disposal in various categories under CCL; concept & procedures in reference to JJ Act, 2015 and Rules thereunder; understanding child psychology; safety and security of children against child sexual abuse in Institutions – way forward ; evolving strategies for effective implementation of provisions of Juvenile Justice Act and ICPS; discussion on innovative and good practices adopted by JJBs in their respective States.

Child Welfare Committees (CWCs)

All children have the right to enjoy their childhood and live in a society which is free from all forms of abuse. But not all of them are fortunate enough to cherish these rights. The JJ Act envisages separate statutory bodies to deal with the two groups of children, distinct from those of the adults, namely the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) for the Children in Need of Care and Protection (CNCP) and the Juvenile Justice Board (JJB) for the Children in Conflict with Law (CICL). The responsibilities of CWC

include care, protection and rehabilitation of children in need of care and protection. Any child rescued from hazardous occupation, abusive home, brothel, abusive family or any other such exploitative situations must be produced before the CWC who is mandated to conduct an enquiry to ensure his or her optimum rehabilitation with minimal damage. It is evident that capacity building of CWC Chairperson/members, occupies an important place in the whole scenario. Keeping this in view, the Institute' Headquarters and Regional Centre, Bengaluru and Guwahati and Indore organized a series of Workshops/**Training Programmes for Child Welfare Committees (CWCs)** with the objectives to: share the present status of child protection and ICPS in the States; analyse the relevance and utilization of knowledge gained in previous programmes in their work situations; share experiences and challenges faced by them; and come out with effective strategies for implementation of JJ Act/ ICPS. The content included: details of revised ICPS scheme and sharing experiences and challenges faced at field level and during hearings; updates relating to laws and policies, besides discussion on emerging issues and evolving strategies/suggestions for effective implementation of provisions of juvenile justice law and ICPS.

Chapter 2

Training Programmes/Activities under Anganwadi Services

Training Programmes

The National Institute of Public Cooperation & Child Development (NIPCCD) is an apex organization under the aegis of Ministry of Women and Child Development to conduct training for functionaries of Anganwadi Services under umbrella Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS) scheme, hence the Institute is responsible for planning, organising, coordinating and monitoring training; building capabilities of various institutions engaged in imparting training; organizing training of trainers; designing, revising and standardising syllabi for training of all categories of functionaries of Anganwadi Services; preparation of training modules and developing, distribution of training reference materials. In recent years, Anganwadi Services under Umbrella ICDS Scheme has witnessed significant changes such as renaming of ICDS as Anganwadi Services; Sabla as Scheme for Adolescent Girls; Integrated Child Protection Scheme as Child Protection Scheme; Rajiv Gandhi National Crèche Scheme as National Crèche Scheme; Implementation of Annual Contextualized ECCE Curriculum, Quality standards in ECCE, Repositioning AWC as vibrant ECCD Centre, ensuring food safety & standards, role delineation of frontline workers, decentralized planning by introducing Annual Programme Implementation Plan (APIP), POSHAN Abhiyan, Pradhan Mantri Matru Vandana Yojana (PMMVY), Supplementary Nutrition Rules, Direct Benefit Transfer, Guidelines for Organization of Training of Anganwadi Services functionaries, E- learning, Rapid Reporting System in Revised Management Information System all across the country, Swachh Bharat Abhiyan etc., for bringing visible changes in delivery of quality services at the field level. All these efforts have also led to expansion of the ambit of training to build the capacity and sharpen the skills of grass root level functionaries for effective service delivery. The Institute has also been providing technical support and feedback to the Ministry of

Women and Child Development (MWCD), Government of India on various components of training of Anganwadi Services functionaries and design training strategies for vast numbers of ICDS functionaries from the top to bottom and developing guidelines for implementation of Training by AWTCs/MLTCs.

At the instance of MWCD the Training Division is also monitoring Anganwadi Workers Training Centres/ Middle Level Training Centres (AWTCs/MLTCs) and ICDS projects for assessing and improving the overall quality of training centres as well as services being rendered by ICDS projects.

The Headquarters and its four Regional Centres of NIPCCD located at Bengaluru, Guwahati, Lucknow and Indore organise training of District Programme Officers (DPOs), Child Development Project Officers (CDPOs)/ Assistant Child Development Project Officers (ACDPOs). The Institute also prepares Master Trainers



to impart training in the areas of ECCE, MIS, New WHO Child Growth Standards, New WHO Child Growth Standards, MCP Card, Social Behaviour Change Communication (SBCC), MIS, Management of Malnutrition, Assessment of Child Learning Outcomes, decentralized planning & management, orientation training of Instructors of AWTCs/MLTCs, Training Skills, Infant & Young Child Feeding (IYCF), Laws related women and children, early detection & management of disability, Beti Bachao Beti Padhao (BBBP), One Stop Centre, ICT, Human Resource Management & Monitoring, Food Safety & Standards

etc. The Headquarters and its Regional Centres also organise Training of Trainers (TOTs) of AWTCs and MLTCs. Supervisors and AWWs are trained at MLTCs and AWTCs respectively, which are identified and commissioned by the state governments.

The activities of the Institute in the area of training of Senior Officials of ICDS, DPOs, CDPOs, ACDPOs, Trainers and other related tasks are presented in the following sections.

Training of Functionaries of Anganwadi Services

Job Training Course (JTC) for Child Development Project Officer (CDPOs)/ Assistant Child Development Project Officers (ACDPOs)



The CDPOs/ACDPOs are provided initial Job Training at NIPCCD Headquarters and its Regional Centres. The main objectives of the training are to: orient the trainee CDPOs/ACDPOs about Anganwadi Services Scheme – its vision, objectives, package of services and beneficiaries; familiarise them with their role and responsibilities vis-à-vis job responsibilities of other block functionaries in coordination, supervision, and management of Anganwadi Services project; share with them the need, importance and strategies for convergence of services at various levels of implementation; develop the skills required for guiding grass roots level functionaries in pre-school education, health & nutrition and community participation; and equip them with knowledge for effective leadership, supportive supervision and management of Anganwadi

Services projects. In all, the Institute organized 11 Job Training Courses for CDPOs/ACDPOs during the year 2017-18 and trained 298 participants.

E-Learning Portal of NIPCCD

e-Learning Portal <www.nipccd-elearning.wcd.nic.in>

The electronic mode of learning or e-Learning is the

beginning of new age literacy which focuses on the electronic approach towards learning. The term "e-learning" has only been in existence since 1999 and other words also began to evolve in search for an accurate description such as "online learning" and "virtual learning". However in India the digital literacy started in its full swing under the Digital India Programme. Digital India (DI) is a campaign launched by the Government of India to ensure that Government services are made available to citizens electronically by improved online infrastructure and by increasing Internet connectivity or by making the country digitally empowered in the field of technology. Taking forward the vision of Hon'ble Prime Minister, the Institute, under the leadership of Smt. Maneka Sanjay Gandhi, Hon'ble Union Minister of Women and Child Development, developed an online literacy portal for its users, mainly Anganwadi Services functionaries who cannot attend residential courses. This portal was launched on 25 May 2016.

The e-Learning portal is an interactive, user-friendly and a self-study platform, created to provide an opportunity and access to technical concepts and knowledge to communicate and build their capacity with a much wider audience at a faster pace. It helps the individual acquire a customized package related to key thematic areas of Women and Child Development including Maternal and

Child Care through a self-guided process. There are 520 users from 27 States/UTs who have registered themselves under different courses in the website.

e-Archive Portal <www.nipccd-earchive.wcd.nic.in>

The Institute also has an e-Archive portal. In light of the Digital India Programme of Government of India, e-Archive portal was developed by the Ministry of Women and Child Development, which serves as a full-fledged electronic library and resource centre that helps in storing, accessing, and dissemination of the documents, reports, etc. This e-Archive is a web-enabled platform that maximizes outreach at no cost to the users at all. The e-Archive has resources like IEC material, presentations, statistics, research publications, government's orders, compendium of research articles and reports, training modules, etc., which provides a multifaceted approach to the library which can be downloaded for reference. A total of 1780 documents have been uploaded on the website and 8, 18, 875 hits have been so far been received.

The e-Archive website has been shared with the participants who had attended the Training Programmes at NIPCCD. The functionaries of Anganwadi Services and Child Protection Scheme as well as various Master Trainers found the website very useful.

Chapter 3

Information regarding Research, Evaluation Studies and Other Projects

Completed Research/ Documentation Projects

1. A quick study to evaluate the feasibility of measuring length/height of growth faltered children by AWWs in an ICDS project of Delhi

The Institute undertook the above mentioned study with the objective to: assess the feasibility of height measurement as a part of the core services provided by AWWs under ICDS.

The major findings and conclusions of the study are as under:

I. Profile of respondents

- The sample comprised 30 AWWs, 450 children {300 children aged 2-6 years and 150 infants (0-2 years)} of which 233 were females and 217 were males.

II. Baseline Knowledge of AWWs regarding Growth Monitoring and Length Measurement

i. Knowledge of AWWs about length/height measurement as a method to assess growth

- Majority (70%) of AWWs reported that growth of children could be assessed by measuring both length/height and weight whereas 30 per cent were of the opinion that weight is the only measure for assessing growth among children. Also, 46 per cent of AWWs reported that weight measurement alone was sufficient to predict nutritional status of children.
- Further, over 85 per cent AWWs agreed that length/height measurement for children can be carried out in same manner as we do in case of adults.

ii. Knowledge of AWWs about length/height measurement

- Majority of AWWs (96.7%) were not aware of the difference between length and weight. It was also

found that AWWs were unaware of the instruments or the names of the instruments used for measuring length/height.

iii. Perception of AWWs about inclusion of length/height in ICDS

- All the AWWs agreed that of length/height measurement should be included in ICDS and majority (70%) consented for all children less than 6 years.

III. Impact of Training on knowledge level of AWWs regarding Growth Monitoring and Length Measurement

It was observed that the knowledge of AWWs regarding growth monitoring and length/height measurement improved tremendously. The difference in responses obtained pre-training and post-training for most of the variables were found to be of statistical significance. The results also show that more AWWs were able to describe a correct way of measuring length/height while a child is crying and in case where the child is not able to straighten his/her legs in the post-training assessment.

Recommendations

Based on the results of the study, the following recommendations have been drawn:

- In the absence of trained anthropometrists, community workers such as AWWs and ASHAs could be formally trained to measure weight and height on regular basis for growth monitoring.
- It was found that all AWWs were able to measure height and most were able to measure length of children post one-day training. However, the current study was on a small scale and therefore its results cannot be generalized for the entire country. A multicentre study targeting AWWs from all states / UTs is recommended.

- In order for growth monitoring and promotion to be effective, training, supervision and support for AWWs must be improved in terms of frequency and quality.
- The study revealed that majority of AWWs were unaware about the various indicators of growth other than being underweight. Like for example, low height for age which is termed as ‘stunting’ was new for them. Therefore, it was recommended that special skill-based training on anthropometry covering knowledge about various ways to detect growth faltering should be undertaken so that the knowledge of workers is improved.
- One of the activities envisaged under National Nutrition Mission (NNM) is to record weight every month and height/length every three months. The training of AWWs may be done in a cascading manner and thereby a pool of Master Trainers can be created which can ultimately train ground-level functionaries for taking height/length measurement. Therefore, it was suggested that AWWs should be formally trained in a phased-wise manner to measure height of children between 0-6 years under NNM.

2. Expanding the scope of existing services of CCC: Fostering Parental Involvement in Improving School Readiness of Children

The Institute undertook the above project with the objective to foster parental involvement in improving school readiness of children.

The Parent Guide provides practical examples of activities and games that parents can utilize with their children at home to maximize their learning potential. The Parent Guide covers the following – school readiness; cognitive skills for school readiness (matching, classifying, understanding relationships, perceiving patterns, problem solving); physical skills; social and emotional skills; developing spoken

language; reading eadiness; writing readiness; and pre-arithmetic skills.

3. Parental Guidance Material on Common Childhood Disorders

The objectives of the project undertaken by the Institute were to: facilitate parents to gain right perspective about the child and the disorder; document a sample of home based activities parents can conduct to circumvent the deficits; empower families with strategies to identify and nurture strengths of the child; strengthen resilience of the family unit through family support activities; develop parental guidance material to bridge the gap in information and awareness and enhance parental perception about the developmental disorders; empower families with strategies to promote wellbeing and optimal development of the child; and strengthen resilience of the family unit through family support activities and strategies. The contents of the booklet included: *What is the disorder, the Symptoms?; How does it feel to be a child with the disorder?; How is it diagnosed?; other associated issues; developmental changes across childhood years; what helps in management of the disorder?; how can parents support the child?; how can school support the child?; discovering the strength of the child; useful parenting tips; best outcomes/ Worst outcomes; and resources, etc.*

4. Monitoring of Child Care Institutions functioning under ICPS

The above mentioned project was taken up by the Institute in order to generate information for improving the Child Care Institution's facilities and to enrich training inputs in the capacity building programmes organized by the Institute. Faculties of the Institute visited Seventeen States and monitored 91 Child Care Institutions providing care and protection to Children in Conflict with Law & Children in Need of Care Protection comprising: Children Homes (56), Open Shelters (3), Observation Homes (15), Specialised Adoption Agency (11) and Shelter Homes (6) during the period of February–July, 2016.

The data pertaining to basic details of home and children, standards of care in terms of child care facilities, staffing, physical infrastructure, adoption performance, financial transparency, inspection and audit, linkages and coordination of home, etc., was collected from various Homes functioning under the J.J. Act. It was found that more than nine thousand five hundred child care institutions were functioning at the time of data collection. However, only 1626 CCIs were funded by MWCD. In this connection, effort was made to observe whether these funded child care institutions were providing quality services to children and were established as per the ICPS norms.

5. Manual on Conceptualizing and Writing Proposals for Social Development Projects

The Institute undertook the above-mentioned project with the objectives to: develop a manual delineating detailed processes as to how to conceptualize a project aiming at welfare and development of people with specific reference to women and children and how to pen down the conceived ideas in various formats which are generally used for submitting project proposals. The Manual contained seven chapters, wherein information was provided about: understanding the concept of project; conceptualizing a project; designing the blue print of a social development project; legal and income tax regulations governing voluntary organizations; writing project proposals; and suggested model project proposal.

6. Study on Cases under POCSO Act, 2012 dealt by Designated Courts in Delhi

The Institute undertook this study with the objectives to: study and analyse the verdicts given in cases registered

under the POCSO Act, 2012 by different designated Special Courts in districts of Delhi; study the reasons behind the delay in disposal of cases under POCSO Act, 2012 and nature and trends reported, investigated and being tried under POCSO Act, 2012; and suggest appropriate measures to improve the implementation of POCSO Act, 2012.

Major Findings

I. Cases Booked

It was found that FIRs were lodged in 62 cases (56.3%) on the day of the incident itself. In 34 cases (30.9%) FIRs were lodged on the next day of occurrence of the crime followed by 14 cases (12.7%) in which FIRs were lodged almost a week after the occurrence of the offence, which was quite gloomy.

II. Types of Sexual Abuse Faced by Victims

It was observed that out of 110 cases, 42 victims (38.18%) were found to have been sexually assaulted. It was also found that as many as 130 accused were involved in assaulting these victims sexually. Most of the victims studied (75) were sexually harassed. In 36 cases, accused constantly followed or tried to maintain contact with the child directly or indirectly. This was followed by another form of sexual harassment, i.e., obscene behaviour with the child. In 12 cases, it was revealed that, the victims were made to exhibit his/her body or a part of the body.

III. Age and Educational Status of Victims

It was found that most of the victims (41) were in the age-group of 16 years and above. Out of 110 cases studied, eight victims were found to be male children. It was further observed that highest number of child victims (46) were studying in high school followed by 17 children who were at intermediate level. It was found that very young children (7) going to play school also fell victims of child sexual abuse.

iv. About the Accused Persons

In as many as 19 cases, more than one accused was involved.

v. Recording of Statement

It was found that in maximum number of cases (37), recording of statement took place on the day of filing of FIR only. In 35 cases, recording took place one day after the FIR was lodged while in 35 cases, it happened after 2 days of filing of FIR. Strangely enough, in 13 cases, recording of statement took place after a month of filing of FIR.

vi. Whether produced before Child Welfare Committee (CWC)

It was observed that as many as 86 child victims (78.18%) were produced before the CWC; however, in no case, they were sent for institutional care.

vii. Medical Examination of the Victims

The study found that in 75 cases (68.18%) medical examination was conducted. In rest of the cases (35), medical examination was not done. However, the reason behind non-conduct of medical examination was found to be refusal by the victims and parents. Medical examination in 72 cases (96%) was conducted by a lady doctor. It was gathered that the victims were subjected to kissing, licking, sucking in 29 cases (38.6%). It was closely followed by touching, fondling in 19 cases (25.3%). In 12 cases, exhibition of sexual organs took place while ejaculation. It was found that oral sex (3) and forced masturbation (2) was also performed on victims. In as many as 30 cases, attempted penetration on genital vagina/urethra by penis also took place and in 30 cases, complete penetration by the same mode was applied. As many as 41 (54.6%) victims changed clothes after the violence and 37 (49.3%) of the victims cleared/washed clothes and undergarments. Thirty-two victims (42.6%) changed undergarments after the violence. Twenty-two victims (29.3%) reported to have passed urine after the incident. As many as four victims were hit with fist, hand, blunt object and sharp object. Forty-two victims were

reported to have suffered from enlargement of hymeneal ring and vaginal bleeding took place in thirteen cases. Pregnancy took place in two cases and one child victim contracted Sexually Transmitted Disease (STD). As many as 24 victims reported to have been abused more than once.

viii. Assistance/Support Received by Victims

Only three (2.73%) child victims received assistance provided by Delhi Legal Services Authority. As per the records available in all 110 cases studied, services of support person were being provided. However, none of them, ever availed the services of an expert.

ix. Trial of Cases

In as many as 36 cases, it was ensured that victims were not exposed to the accused in any way, through use of wooden partition (30), one way visibility glass (27) and recording done in a different room (17).

x. Adjournments

In 43 cases, more than five adjournments took place, while two adjournments took place in case of 21 cases, followed by only one adjournment in 18 cases, four adjournments in 15 cases and three adjournments in 15 cases. Only in three cases, the number of adjournments were ten or more than ten.

xi. Nature of Verdict

It was found that out of 110 cases studied, verdict was pronounced in 63 cases. Out of 63 cases, acquittal was pronounced in 50 cases (79.3%). Only 13 accused were convicted and punishment was pronounced accordingly.

There were six types of charges proven against the accused. Interestingly, two types of charges were not the part of offences identified in POCSO Act, 2012. However, these were shown as harm to children. Other charges included: kidnapping (4 cases), aggravated penetrative sexual assault (3 cases), followed by aggravated sexual assault (2), sexual harassment (2), sexual assault (1) and charge mentioned in Section 357 of Cr. PC (1).

In almost half of the acquitted cases, the reason was found to be victim turning hostile and refusing to accept occurrence of any such incident/did not support the prosecution. In 24 per cent cases (12), the accused was acquitted, as the prime witness denied having any knowledge of occurrence of such incident. The other significant reason came out to be the voluntary physical relationship of the victim with the accused. The other reasons were: medical report did not show any sign of injury, either the victim or the witness or both failed to recognize the accused and delay in filing FIR giving the accused more time to strategize and escape punishment, etc.

Suggestions/Recommendations

- It was found that services of Legal Service Authority had been utilized by only insignificant number of child victims.
- Legal Services Authority could play a crucial role in informing the victim and his/her family about the legal process in every case.
- Special Court should mandatorily ensure that each POCSO case get the support of Legal Services Authority.
- It was observed that not a single child victim was sent for institutional care.
- In some cases, it was found that the father or a close relative was the perpetrator. As per POCSO Act, keeping in view the best interest of the child, the victim should preferably be put into institutional care temporarily to avoid further contact with perpetrator. Special Courts must look into this aspect at the time of trial.
- Special Court must seriously look into the cases where FIR was not lodged within 24 hours of occurrence of the incident. The persons responsible for the delay may be made answerable for such negligence.
- It was observed that in some cases, recording was done after a month of filing the FIR. This aspect

needs to be looked into very seriously as delay in recording the statement may result in making the victim hostile.

- It was found that none of the cases studied, were reported to have received the assistance of an expert. Special Court may issue necessary directions to ensure assistance of such experts who could assist the child victim in the process of receiving justice.
- Special Court may also ensure that all the cases coming under its Jurisdiction are booked under sections of POCSO Act, 2012 only.
- Out of the 110 cases studied, 47 cases were pending before the Special Courts. Courts may ensure completion of each case within the stipulated one year.
- Frequency in number of adjournments in each case may be looked into by Special Courts.

7. Study on Awareness about Child Protection Issues and Services available at the Panchayat Level

The present study was carried out by the Institute in Northern part of India. The area of study was considered at districts identified as “Beti Bachao Beti Padhao (BBBP) Districts” where the Child Sex Ratio (CSR) was considerably low. The total sample of respondents were 100 comprising village Sarpanch, Chairperson of Block Panchayat Samiti and District Panchayat. The objectives of the study were to: identify the gaps in knowledge and awareness among the representatives of PRIs on child protection and child rights; assess the awareness of PRI representatives about their own role and responsibilities in supporting abused children and their families; and identify the services and structures available at Panchayat-level for child protection against Child Sexual Abuse.

Findings of the Study

The awareness on Child Protection and Child Rights at the village-level Panchayati Raj Institutions was

considerable as the panchayat members (Sarpanch) were not so much aware about the laws, policies and schemes related to child protection and safety.

There were many co-factors that were covered under the area of study, viz., education, training, gender and social fabrication to work with community as a panchayat member. However, the findings revealed that issue of child protection was never given much importance. The panchayat members somehow were of the opinion that they did not have direct responsibility for child protection in the Panchayat.

The Panchayat members neither had any specific funds earmarked for child safety, nor did the panchayat provide any type of compensation to the victims of child sexual abuse. It was observed that large number of people appointed as Zila Pramukh were post-graduate, many of the Block Pramukhs were at least found to have studied till Matric. The majority of village Pradhan/Sarpanch were just literate or mostly till Matric and few of them were graduate. The chairpersons were educated and having knowledge on child protection issues. The socio-culture in the rural areas prevailing in the society was another factor to not initiate action against the culprits so the child protection issues remained un-addressed. The village panchayat was not able to interfere in the matter of child sexual abuses as judicial action was required on these issues.

The Block and district level officers were not willing to visit the Observation Homes or Child Welfare Committees because they were not sensitized for such visits or presence in those Institutions. However, they frequently visit at Police Stations for such incidents occurring in their jurisdiction. There were some respondents at Block Panchayat having political experiences for more than 20 years, their performance was found very good in terms of social work like working against domestic violence, addressing and solving family issues and work as counsellor; but as far as the issue of child protection was concerned there was complete ignorance and lack of support in addressing the same. There was no training imparted for panchayat members after their appointment as Sarpanch or Block

and District-level Panchayat Officers on Child Protection issues.

It was found that girl children need safety on their way to school as many schools were at least 5-10 kilometers away from their homes. The parents were reluctant to send their girls for higher education in schools/colleges situated far away.

It was observed that the elected representatives of local self-government had a positive role to play in the effective implementation of the POCSO Act, 2012 not only in raising public awareness on children's rights and in disseminating a new culture of child-adult relationships, but in their chart of responsibility as provided by the Panchayati Raj department. However, it was not mentioned as to whether a sarpanch, block pramukh or district panchayat chairperson has the responsibility or is equipped to take action on child protection issues or to prevent violence against children. The elected representatives were aware of the problems faced by the children in their locality. It was observed that very few panchayat members supported and reported child sexual abuse. Neither did they offer any help to the victim nor did they take any action to punish the culprit by constituting a Khap Panchayat. The panchayat members elaborated that they can contribute their services to achieve the objectives of the POCSO Act, 2012 by providing technical support to children's institutions in developing Child Protection Policies, addressing issues of recruitment, monitoring, complaints mechanism, disciplinary proceedings, and police reporting within their own institutional setting. But, due to lack of funds and not receiving adequate training they felt helpless in addressing such situations.

Services available at Panchayat level: It was observed that there were no services available at Panchayati Raj Institutions as far as the child protection issue was concerned. Anganwadi Centres were found very active though. The Primary Health Centre, police station, observation and children homes were found at a distance of 10 to 15 kilometers. The ambulance services though found to be very effective in all the surveyed area, it was not sufficient for emergency medical check-up for child

sexual abuse as it was beyond the jurisdiction of PRI. Panchayat members were not aware about the compensation provision for victims so they never approached court or police. The district panchayats never coordinated with Child Welfare Committees, though they said that they were aware of Juvenile Justice Board. There was no list of institutions (NGOs) at District Panchayat level. The District Legal Services Authorities, SJPU and SCPCR, District Child Protection Unit were never in the contact of Panchayat members.

Recommendations

- It may be recommended that the level of education of panchayat members must be prescribed by the Panchayati Raj Department or by Election Commission so that the village panchayat members can understand and implement the laws, policies and programmes related to child sexual abuse.
- There is a need of Training of Panchayat members on child protection and its related laws like POCSO Act, JJ Act, ITPA, RTE, Child Marriage Act, Child Labour Act, etc., as they can play a vital role on child protection issue.
- Public awareness, sensitization and mobilization of parents, caregivers, community and other actors in civil society on child protection issues are very important. These activities are possible when the panchayat members are themselves trained for action and supported by rural development department by keeping such agenda in their plan of action.
- Panchayati Raj Department may be suggested to include child protection issues in the job responsibilities of a panchayat members as a part of rural development and provision of fund may be earmarked for such activities.
- Convergence with related Ministries/ Department at Central and State levels is need to be maintained
- CHILDLINE and other necessary support service, infrastructure, referral for children in emergency situations are required to be maintained.

- Combating trafficking of narcotic drugs, psychotropic substance to prevent the use by children and creating mechanisms for rehabilitation of child substance abusers to reduce the incidences of delinquent children there is need to sensitization programme for Police department at District level to deal with the situation.
- Maintaining disaggregated database for all categories of children in difficult circumstances, including child sexual abuse, child labour, child marriage, disabled children etc. through Census and programme specific Management Information System (MIS).

8. Information Kit on Children in Need of Care and Protection: Issues, Programmes and Services

The above-mentioned kit was prepared with the objectives to: generate awareness regarding children in need of care and protection; create awareness about the available programmes and services for them; facilitate coordination among different stakeholders for better support; and serve as a reference document for all stakeholders. The kit provided information in the areas of: 1) Children in need of Care and Protection in India: Statistics; 2) Frequently Asked Questions; 3) Rights for Children; 4) Child Protection System; 5) Child Welfare Committee (CWC)- Statutory Body to deal with CNCP Children; 6) Role of Police in Juvenile Justice System; 7) Role of other Stakeholders in Juvenile Justice System; 8) Rehabilitation and Re-integration; 9) Services Provided for children in Institutions; 10) Indoor Games for Children.

9. Booklets for School Children to Generate Awareness on Child Sexual Abuse (CSA)

The above booklet was prepared with the objectives to: generate awareness among children about child sexual offences and guarding against them; ways of seeking help by child victims of sexual offences; and forming support system against child sexual abuse in different

settings (home/school/neighbourhood/travel, etc.) and develop their capabilities to take informed immediate action/decisions as growing individuals. The Booklet provided information in the areas of: understanding child sexual abuse; facts and figures on child sexual abuse; frequently asked questions about CSA; legal provisions dealing with child sexual abuse in India; empowering children to protect themselves; role of stakeholders in addressing child sexual abuse; questions to practice decision-making; and myths and facts on child sexual abuse.

10. Handbook on POCSO Act, 2012 for School Staff and Management

The main objectives of the Handbook were to: prepare a Handbook which will provide material in simple language for understanding the provisions of the Act, create awareness among school management and staff about the Act; and make available a handy tool for capacity building of school management and staff who are required to deal with cases of child victims of sexual offences. The Handbook covered the entire range of issues related to sexual offences against children, fundamentals of child protection and the provisions of the act, therapeutic interventions for children, prevention of child sexual abuse in schools, roles and responsibilities of school management and staff in dealing with cases of sexual offences against children. Completed and uploaded on the NIPCCD website.

11. Training of Trainers: A Handbook for Instructors of AWTCs/MLTCs

This Handbook was prepared with the aim to enable the trainers of AWTCs and MLTCs to be able to plan and organize training programmes using proper training process, i.e., Systematic Approach to Training (SAT) training objectives, various methods of training and evaluation methods. This is an effort to address the issues faced by the Instructors while conducting training, with a thoroughly practical orientation. This is both a reference manual as well as usable tool for the Instructors of AWTCs and MLTCs. This Handbook is designed to

provide the Instructors with tips, tools and techniques on a wide range of subjects – which they can apply in the training centers. This Handbook will guide the Instructors towards successful planning and organization of training programmes. The contents and the ideas in this Handbook will help the Instructors to stay focused on their results.

All the Instructors of AWTCs and MLTCs and other grassroots level Training Institutes can use this document too. Even experienced Trainers, master trainers and Project Managers can benefit from this book. Even experienced trainers can consider improving their training efforts. This will put them on the right track to redesign their courses. Even if they are experienced trainers they may restructure the training approach to fit the needs of their trainees. They may discover that they need additional training to meet the performance goals that they have set.

12. E-learning manual for ICDS Functionaries

Under the Digital India Programme, the Hon'ble Union Minister of Women and Child Development, Smt. Maneka Sanjay Gandhi, launched <www.nipccd-elearning.wcd.nic.in>, on 25 May, 2016. ICDS functionaries or professionals working in the area of Health and Nutrition, Child Development, Child Protection, Women issues, Paramedics like Nurses, Dieticians, students of Home Science colleges, Medical Professionals, Trainers of Training Institutes or mothers, and those who wish to have knowledge or keep themselves abreast with latest ideas in Maternal and Child Development may enroll for the courses.

As the number of users started to scale up for various courses on the website a need was felt for an easy to understand user manual. The objective of the manual was to ensure that it should help the users in registration, enrolment and completion of courses. The e-learning manual for ICDS Functionaries focuses on the functioning of the online portal i.e. www.nipccd-elearning.wcd.nic.in.

The e-Learning portal was created as an interactive, user-friendly and a self-study platform, which shall provide an opportunity and access to technical concepts and knowledge to communicate and build their capacity with a much wider audience at a faster pace. It helps an individual to acquire a customized package related to key thematic areas of Women and Child Development including Maternal and Child Care through a self-guided process. It became important to create a manual which justifies the purpose and objective of the portal.

The portal has been created to offer online job Training Courses for ICDS functionaries and other basic courses for general public. The e-Learning manual for ICDS functionaries act as a handy and easy to understand guide as well as tool. It's an illustrative user manual which helps a user to access the website and register himself for the course thereby starting the course. The manual is equipped in such a way that it can be used as a self-help book for e-learning courses that are available on the website.

The manual works as a standardized instructions book as well as checklist which is free from the delivery of the trainers. As a self-guided manual it usually answers all the questions of the user. The learning approach of the manual is for knowledge dissemination and ease of facilitation for the beneficiaries and the learners.

13. Comprehensive Training Guidelines for Middle Level Training Centres (MLTCs) and Anganwadi Training Centres (AWTCs)

For holistic development of the child, the Ministry has been implementing the world's largest and most unique and outreach flagship programme of Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS) providing a package of services comprising supplementary nutrition, immunization, health check-up and referral services, pre-school non-formal education. The Integrated Child Development Services, a centrally-sponsored scheme, is

implemented by the States/UTs which was launched on 2 October, 1975 and has now been expanded from 33 projects to 7,075 Projects and 13.53 lakhs Anganwadi centres (as on 28 February 2017). ICDS is designed to promote all-round development of children under-six years and improve service delivery at the community-level.

Effective implementation of ICDS programme depends, to a considerable extent, on the proper training of the Anganwadi workers and supervisors who are the para grassroots-level functionaries attached to the beneficiaries of ICDS programme for the delivery of the package of services of ICDS with the ultimate aim of moulding these ICDS functionaries into "agents of social and behavioural change" instead of simply reacting to the situation and to bring about behavioural change in the community. The importance of training and continuous capacity building of the ICDS functionaries in ICDS is well recognized as vital for success of the programme.

Keeping this view in mind the, "Comprehensive Training Guidelines for Middle Level Training Centres (MLTCs) and Anganwadi Training Centres (AWTCs)" was developed. The core areas that were highlighted in the manual were: strengthening Training and Capacity Building; training structure and pattern; setting Up of MLTCs and AWTCs by State/UTs; selection criteria for commissioning MLTC/AWTC; infrastructural facility of MLTCs/AWTCs; staffing pattern of MLTCs/AWTCs; financial provision for training centres; monitoring and supervision; and online training of instructors of MLTCs and AWTCs: e-Learning.

14. Framework for Capacity-building Programme for Elected Women Representatives of Panchayati Raj Institutions

The Capacity Building of Elected Women Representatives (EWRs) is essential to empower women to participate effectively in the governance processes. It was in this backdrop that the Ministry of Women and Child Development (MWCD) initiated an extensive

training programme through the National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development (NIPCCD) with an objective of empowering EWRs who will serve as catalysts for social change and function as peer facilitators in the field. The objectives of the training programme of EWRs were to: deliberate upon issues related to empowerment of women and children and functioning of PRIs; discuss flagship programmes of Central and State Government for women, children and marginalized groups; impart knowledge on legislations for the protection of the vulnerable; provide practical know-how to monitor asset creation and public works in the villages and process of participatory planning in local governance; discuss recent developments related to dry dairy farming and e-banking, cashless transactions, etc; and enable women to identify their leadership potential to contribute effectively as change agents.

The Institute prepared a Training Framework to train the Master Trainers for imparting a three-day Training along with eight booklets meant for distribution among EWRs. Efforts were made to ensure that deliberations and topics in the framework and Booklets were gender-friendly and the content focused on issues from the perspective of women and children.

A two-tier cascade mode of training strategy was adopted across 414 districts of 14 states (Bihar, Chhattisgarh, Dadar & Nagar Haveli, Gujarat, Haryana, Himachal Pradesh, Jharkhand, Karnataka, Kerala, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Odisha, Rajasthan and Uttar Pradesh) where in at the first level of 478 Master Trainers were trained through Training of Trainers Programme (ToT) from different organizations working in the domain of Panchayati Raj. At the second level, the Capacity Building Training programmes of EWRs were organized between November 2017 and March 2018 at the District level by 28 Partner organizations. NIPCCD trained 18,578 EWRs across 414 districts of the country through its partner organizations.

The Capacity Building Programmes not only focused on technical content, but also laid emphasis on

communication skills, participatory adult learning approaches ensuring involvement of the trainees and was seen to sustain their interests despite their varied educational background. Some of the specific strategies used in different states to make the programme more relevant for their participants included the use of motivational songs, folk media, ice-breaking activities, short films, focused group discussions, use of games, etc.

16. A Documentation of Indigenous Plays and Play Materials for Children up to Eight Years of Age in the North-Eastern Region

Rationale

Appropriate growth and development of children are two very important factors for their own life as well as for the society and the nation. It is an established fact that development during the early years of life lays the foundation of the rest of the life of any individual. Growth is a quantitative change where the child's body size and weight increase. After birth, rapid growth occurs in the first two years. Development is a qualitative change where in an orderly process of changes occur in a child by displaying abilities towards increasingly more

complex ways of moving, thinking, speaking, feeling and relating to people and objects in the environment. Environment plays a pivotal role in determining children's development. Environment that are rich and supportive, help the children to develop abilities quickly, whereas, the environments that are not rich and stimulating, children are likely to develop satisfactorily.

Play activities in children becomes more meaningful if the adults can guide the play activities properly. Adults should know the nature of play, various stages of play, and components of play, play materials, etc. Vygotsky also argues that parents and older children offer assistance, present challenges, provide instruction and encourage the child's interest and motivation (Shona Traditional Children's Games and Play: Songs as Indigenous Ways of Knowing). In all societies indigenous plays/games are in vogue that children learn from their ancestors. Many such plays are associated with lullabies or songs, carrying ethnic meanings of a particular community. Children often enjoy such activities and in this way the indigenous plays/games are in practice. Accordingly, adults make play materials for their children using indigenous materials available in their areas. Researchers have documented some of such plays/games in our country.

Findings

The project tried to explore and document different local plays/games; various play materials, toys, etc. and also the use of such play materials. Accordingly, a total of 118 games, 28 categories of play materials, 49 stories and 45 lullabies were collected from the states visited. There were some games/play activities where these were either common or played with a little variation. Some of the games/play activities and play materials were found unique to the particular state. Everywhere, influence of culture in some of the play activities, stories and lullabies were also noticed in the states visited.

17. Implementation of Constitutional Polices, Acts and Programmes on Development of Tribal Women and Children in the State of Madhya Pradesh: An Impact

The above study was undertaken by the Institute with the objectives to: study the extent of awareness in the community on constitutional provisions, acts and programmes made for development of tribal women and children; assess the extent of benefits reaching to tribal community specially women and children; explore the bottlenecks involved in implementation of Government programmes and; suggest measures for effective implementation of the constitutional provisions, acts and programmes for development of tribal women and children.

Findings

- The finding indicated that 54.19 per cent tribal women are aware about educational safeguards, and 45.81 per cent tribal women are not aware about it.
- Only 39.4 per cent tribal women are aware about Economic safeguards while 60.4 per cent tribal are not aware about it.
- Awareness for Panchayat (Extension to Scheduled Areas) Act 2003(PESA) there are large no tribal woman who are not aware and their Percentage is 65 per cent, only 35 per cent tribal women aware about it.
- 81.7 per cent tribal families and their family members are facing economic scarcity, poverty is biggest problem of tribal community in MP.
- Medical facility for tribals, there are 55 per cent tribals who have taken benefit under medical services.
- In the tribal areas 80 per cent tribal villages has availability of AWC while only 46.7 per cent tribal families are getting benefit from AWC.
- Many respondent answered about Construction Development work running in their area. while 70.6 per cent answered no Construction/ Development work is running in their area.

Recommendations

- Majority of tribal women were illiterate or less educated, government should conduct suitable awareness programmes and motivate them through Gram Sabha, extensive campaigning, etc.
- As per the study, for majority of tribal families monthly income is below Rs. 2000. In the tribal remote area there is problem of income resources, many tribals are dependent only on 4-month agricultural cycle, after rainy season most of tribals have no work to do, they are compelled to migrate. Income generation activities may be provided round the year.
- Majority of tribal families are surviving below Poverty Line, findings of the study - 77.8% tribal families are surviving under BPL, government must focus on special programme for BPL development and provide economic support. Must provide vocational training programme and livelihood training programme according to their need and interests.
- Government should set target for minimum number of beneficiaries for every programme and scheme, because many tribals are not benefited due to non-availability of targets.
- The Health department should organize community health programme in tribal remote areas and work for health and hygiene awareness, and provide guidance and referral services for medical treatment.
- Government must strengthen Anganwadi Centres, (AWC) because an Anganwadi is one of the important unit for development; it can lead to holistic development of mother and children and also lead to behaviour change in tribal.
- Government should promote and build markets in tribal areas and provide a platform for them to do business and transactions.
- Guidance and counselling centre at block level for adolescent tribes is a must.

- There should be special focus on National Programmes like - PMMVY, PMKY, Beti Bachao Beti Padhao, Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, etc., in tribal areas and ensure their participation in these programmes.

Other Ongoing Projects

Lucknow CHILDLINE

CHILDLINE, a National Project under the Ministry of Women and Child Development, is being implemented by the Childline India Foundation. Since December 2001, the Institute's Regional Centre Lucknow has been associated with Childline project as a Nodal Organization. Human Unity Movement (HUM), a voluntary organization, is working as a collaborate organization and carrying out Childline efforts with Nodal Organization at City level by running a call centre, case intervention and follow ups, awareness in the community and networking with Government Departments and voluntary organizations at city level. The call centre received a total number of 1286 calls during the year 2017-18 for missing children. These cases were provided services such as intervention, referrals, counselling and restoration of missing children. The category-wise call details are as mentioned below:

Under advocacy and networking building initiative at city level, 132 outreach activities, 14 special days celebration, six camps at different places of Lucknow, nine open house meeting, one nukkad natak and one free health check-up of children were organized. Two major training programmes for various stakeholders of ICPS were also organized.

Workshop

The Childline is also working as a Childline protection unit and is entrusted with the responsibility of sensitizing such personnels who are in direct / indirect contact with children. In order to sensitize and orient stakeholders/individuals on the rights of children to achieve the above objective, a meeting of resource organizations was organized by the Institute's Regional Centre Lucknow with the objectives to: provide information on child rights and protection; provide an insight into the functioning of Childline as a Child Protection Unit; create clarity and understanding of the roles and responsibilities of the personnel involved in child protection system; and facilitate smooth functioning of Childline in the city.

In the above context, one workshop was organized with Vyapar Mandal and Allied System on the occasion of International Day against Child Labour on 12 June, 2017 with the objective to sensitize the Vyapar Mandal on Child Labour Issues.

Guwahati CHILDLINE

Guwahati CHILDLINE intervened a total of 671 number of cases comprising medical, shelter, restoration, child abuse, child in conflict with law, missing, emotional support and guidance. Three Directors' Meeting and four Coordinators and Team Meeting were conducted during the year. A Sensitization CUM Interactive Session was conducted at the Police Reserve, Guwahati among the Assistant. Commissioners of Police and Child Welfare Police Officers on

9 December, 2017 an Orientation Workshop was conducted for the CHILDLINE Partners of Assam in collaboration with CHILDLINE India Foundation from 15-16 March, 2018.

A total of thirteen open house meetings were also conducted in different areas of the city among the community members, stakeholders and children. The Institute's Regional Centre also observed Children's day and 'CHILDLINE se Dosti' from 14-20 November, 2017 in collaboration with CRPF, Group Centre and SSA, Assam. A two-day awareness programme was organized at the Community Hall and Kendriya Vidyalaya of CRPF, Group Centre at Amrigog and a Sensitization Programme was organized at the Residential Schools of SSA, Assam at Guwahati and Kamrup. The World Day against Child Labour was also observed on June 12, 2017

in collaboration with National Child Labour Project Committee, Kamrup (M) under the District Administration Kamrup (M). A rally was taken out and a workshop was organized at District Library. Apart from this, CHILDLINE number along with some messages on child labour was promoted by the Politicians, Bureaucrats including the Hon'ble Governor and Chief Minister of the State. A bike rally was organized on CHILDLINE Guwahati Foundation Day in collaboration with the Bikers Guwahati Association on 10 February, 2018 to promote awareness on CHILDLINE Number-1098.

Field Demonstration Services

Child Care Centre

- The Child Care Centre (CCC) aims at holistic development of the child. It follows play-way and activity approach to provide a stimulating environment for holistic, i.e., intellectual, social, emotional, physical and language development of the child. The ECE programme is planned taking into account the developmental needs of the children. The child-centered programmes at CCC reflect a balance between individual and group activities, free play and guided activities, active play, indoor and outdoor activities and activities to foster all aspects of development.
- Child Care Centre in New Delhi enrolled 29 children for the academic session April 2017- March 2018 belonging to the neighbouring localities like Shahpur Jat Village, Huaz Khas Police Colony, AIIMS campus, Safdarjung Development Area and NIPCCD Campus. The centre is run for three hours every day from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.
- During the year, the Centre celebrated festivals like Raksha Bandhan, Janamashtami, Holi, Diwali, Christmas, Eid, Universal Children's Day, Independence Day, Republic Day and birthdays of children attending CCC.
- A number of parent workshops were organized at the CCC on themes like 'importance of play-way

method of learning for pre-schoolers'; 'malaria and dengue and its prevention' and 'nutritious recipes for preschoolers', etc.

Child Guidance Clinic

Restoring and Strengthening Emotional Wellbeing of Children and Families

For over three decades, the Institute has been reaching out to the community for promoting emotional wellness and mental health of children. NIPCCD has five **Child Guidance Centres** across the major zones of the country functioning through its Regional Centres and Headquarters. The Regional Centre at Indore launched their CGC in April 2015. All the five Centres provide Centre-based holistic diagnostic assessment services. The Child Guidance Center continued to offer families comprehensive diagnostic assessments through specialized screening and diagnosis of children up to 12 years of age, suspected of, at risk of or showing learning, behavior, attention, and developmental difficulties with diagnostic, therapeutic and referral services.

At Headquarters, during the current year, 164 children were registered for assessment. Along with these, nearly 200 children also maintained follow-up for different interventions at the Centre. The Centre provided **2623 consultations** for various assessments and interventions. During the current year, 32 per cent of children were diagnosed with Learning Disability, 18 per cent with intellectual disability and ten per cent with borderline intelligence. The other hard core disorders included 18 per cent of children with Autism Spectrum Disorder. As mentioned earlier, the rate of identification of children below six years is very low and in our data 6 per cent of the children were diagnosed with developmental delays. These children were recommended intensive early stimulation programmes and monitoring to watch out the probable diagnosis and the need for further interventions and schooling.

The Child Guidance Centre at the Headquarters has acquired **ISO Certification 9001:2008**. The Certification has endorsed the quality services offered

for Comprehensive Diagnostic and Evaluation of child's (up to 12 years of age) cognitive abilities, social adaptation, behaviour, skills, talents, interests & academic learning, personality characteristics and empower parents in restoring and strengthening emotional well-being of the child and the family.

Placement and Internship facilities for Students at CGC

The CGC has been providing clinical exposure to the students of Advanced Diploma in Child Guidance and Counselling throughout the academic year. During the year, 23 students from the Universities in Delhi and outside availed internship opportunities.

At Regional Centre, Lucknow, a total of 56 new cases were registered during the year 2017-18 and a total of **422** consultations were given by the following professionals which also include follow-up cases. At Regional Centre, Guwahati, a total number of cases registered was 259 during the current year.

Adolescent Guidance Service Centre

The Adolescent Guidance Service Centre is striving towards promotion of mental health of adolescents, thereby preventing mental and behavioural problem amongst them by fostering growth, promoting healthy childhood experiences and ensuring access to mental health services. The major objective of Adolescent Guidance Service Center is to provide counselling and psycho-social care for adolescents through a comprehensive adolescent guidance programme. In the current year, the Centre reached out to young adults in the age group of 12-19 years by adopting a two-fold strategy. On one hand, the professionals ventured out to the nearby schools and children's institutions to undertake preventive, promotive and early identification activities, on the other hand, the adolescents were encouraged to come to the Adolescent Guidance Service Centre in the Institute for counselling interventions.



Chapter 4

Documentation and Publication

The National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development (NIPCCD) has a full-fledged Library and a Documentation Centre for Women and Children (DCWC) which caters to the academic and research needs of the staff of the Institute and the students of Advanced Diploma in Child Guidance and Counselling at the Institute. DCWC in a way doubles up as a knowledge house for various students and academicians. A Children's Corner has also been developed in the Library. This Corner has an artistic feel as it has been specifically created to attract children and stack many books and magazines for children. The children visiting the Child Guidance Centre (CGC) and Adolescent Guidance Centre (AGC), love to spend time at the Children's Corner.

DCWC is a member of Developing Libraries Network (DELNET) and has access to resources of other libraries for borrowing books on Inter-Library Loan. All the books in the library have also been entered into the LIBSYS software. In addition to this, all the books in the library are bar coded as well.

This DCWC is constantly engaged in collating information and cataloguing it according to pre-identified fields primarily related to women and children. The Documentation Centre is a rich storehouse of information which includes research, legislations, statistics, and policy matters. The information is kept in the form of hard as well as soft copy.

The following activities were undertaken by DCWC in the area of documentation and dissemination of information during the year 2017-18

1. Collection, Documentation and Dissemination of Information

During the year 2017-18, DCWC had collected about 450 unpublished/ published documents, the Library subscribed to 13 foreign journals, 51 Indian journals, 25 magazines and 21 newspapers. The Documentation

Centre brings out the following publications on monthly/ quarterly basis under the Project titled 'DCWC Regular Activities'.

DCWC Research Bulletin (*A quarterly publication*):

Under this project, Documentation Centre collects and documents valuable research studies and prepares small abstracts of these research studies for the convenience of users along with the bibliographic details. These abstracts are arranged under three broad subject areas: A) Research Abstracts on Child Development; B) Research Abstracts on Child Protection and C) Research Abstracts on Women and Gender Issues.

All the issues of the publication were uploaded on NIPCCD website <www.nipccd.nic.in> on the slot dedicated for Documentation Centre for Women and Children for wider circulation among readers. These research abstracts helps the faculty members to be well-informed about the latest in the field of research. This research bulletin is also circulated to the students of Advanced Diploma in Child Guidance for referring to the latest in the field of Child Development and Child Protection.

DCWC News clips: This monthly publication is a compilation of newspaper clippings from 21 newspapers (including nine Hindi Newspapers) of different regions of the country covering various social issues which are scanned and arranged subject-wise under broad heads and subheads. The daily news is scanned and shared with concerned officials.

DCWC New Addition Service: This quarterly publication is a subject-wise classified publication containing a bibliographic record of books purchased by the Library and unpublished documents acquired in the Documentation Centre. The latest documents which comprise reports from national as well as international organizations is shared with the faculty of NIPCCD to keep them updated with latest in the field.

2. Databases

Database of Documents: All new documents were entered into the computerized database of documents using LIBSYS library software. The software provides easy access to information and a computerized list can be easily generated using keywords.

Database of Organizations: This database contains information collected and updated about government departments, autonomous organizations, research institutes, home science colleges, school/ departments of social work, medical colleges, voluntary organizations, population research centres and international organizations, etc. Regular updates were done.

Current Awareness Service (regular fortnightly update of journals) and new documents from Internet

- i) DCWC also scans the cover page and the contents of the latest issues of the journals and e-mails them to its users at Headquarters and Regional Centres. This is being done to generate awareness among the readers to the issues of the subscribed journals received by the NIPCCD library during the current fortnight.
- ii) DCWC downloads the latest documents/ reports / important circulars from Internet in the PDF format which is e-mailed to NIPCCD faculty.

Special Initiatives in Library/ DCWC

- i) Display of books is organized from time to time for the faculty of NIPCCD for greater awareness of new researches /studies published.
- ii) The students of Advanced Diploma in Child Guidance and Counselling are also given an orientation to Library and books related to their subjects for easy reference.
- iii) A new initiative has been taken to keep the DCWC open for extended hours in the evening to provide reading room facility to the users.

E-Archive Portal of the Institute

In line with the Digital India Programme of the Government of India, the Ministry of Women and Child Development entrusted NIPCCD with the task to develop an e-archive portal which could serve as a full-fledged electronic Library. The e-archive portal was developed by NIPCCD and can be easily accessed by logging on to <www.nipccd-earchive.wcd.nic.in>.

The aim of e-archive is to create a paperless environment which is the first step towards e-government and management of huge flow of documents among different departments/divisions/ units and persons, and to find a faster way to retrieve and disseminate information anytime and anywhere. The Institute has put various documents, research studies, training syllabi and other reference materials pertaining to women and child development in e-archive.

The e-archive portal has many advantages and has enabled many user-friendly search options. The material in e-archive has been categorized in twelve different areas that pertain to Women and Child Development and allied ministries as well as departments. The taxonomy includes Health, Nutrition, Child Development, Child Protection and Welfare, Women Empowerment, Education, Sanitation and Hygiene, Panchayati Raj, Minority Affairs, Other Legislations, Parliaments Questions and Others. All these fields are further classified for easy cataloguing of material like training modules, five year plan, research, reports of workshops/ seminars, IEC material, etc. All this has been done along with easy search options to help the user to find the relevant documents in less time. This e-archive portal has been shared with functionaries who attend training programmes at NIPCCD. A total of 1780 documents have been uploaded on this e-archive portal. The participants attending the training at NIPCCD as also showed the features of the website to access information.

Chapter 5

Organization and Management

The National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development (NIPCCD) has two constitutional bodies, viz., the General Body and the Executive Council. The General Body formulates policies while the Executive Council is responsible for management and administration of the Institute. The Executive Council may set up standing or ad hoc Committees from time to time to discharge certain specific functions. At present, an Ad hoc Building Committee is in existence to oversee the construction of the buildings of the Regional Centres.

Meetings of the General Body and the Executive Council

The 49th Annual General Meeting of the General Body of the Institute was held on 20 March, 2018. It adopted the Annual Report of the Institute for the year 2016-17 and also approved Revised Estimates for the year 2017-18 and Budget Estimates for 2018-19. The General Body, besides adopting the Annual Report of the Institute for 2016-17, made general review of the programmes and activities of the Institute and offered its suggestions.

The 70th Meeting of the Executive Council of the Institute was held on 20 March, 2018. In addition to reviewing the programmes undertaken by the Institute during 2017-18, the Council considered and recommended for approval by General Body the Annual Report of the Institute for the year 2016-17, Revised Estimates for 2017-19 and Budget Estimates for 2018-19. The Executive Council made a general review of the programmes organized by the Institute during the year 2017-18 and expressed its appreciation. The Executive Council considered some proposals relating to the administrative and financial as well.

Funds received from the Government of India

The grant-in-Aid received from the Government of India continued to be the main source of funding the activities of the Institute. During the year 2017-18, the Institute received grant of Rs.5582.00 lakh under Revenue

General, Revenue Salary, Non NER General, Non-NER Capital, NER General and NER Capital. An expenditure of Rs.4798.24 lakh were incurred under these Heads respectively.

Accounts and Audit

The Institute maintains its accounts on the basis of Accrual System of Accounting as provided in Bye-law 60 under the Bye-laws of the Institute. The Audit of the Annual Accounts for 2017-18 was undertaken by M/s. V S Tandon & Co. The Audit Certificate and Annual Accounts of the Institute have been reproduced in the section of "Audit Report and Annual Accounts" 2017-18 of this Annual Report.

Implementation of Official Language Policy

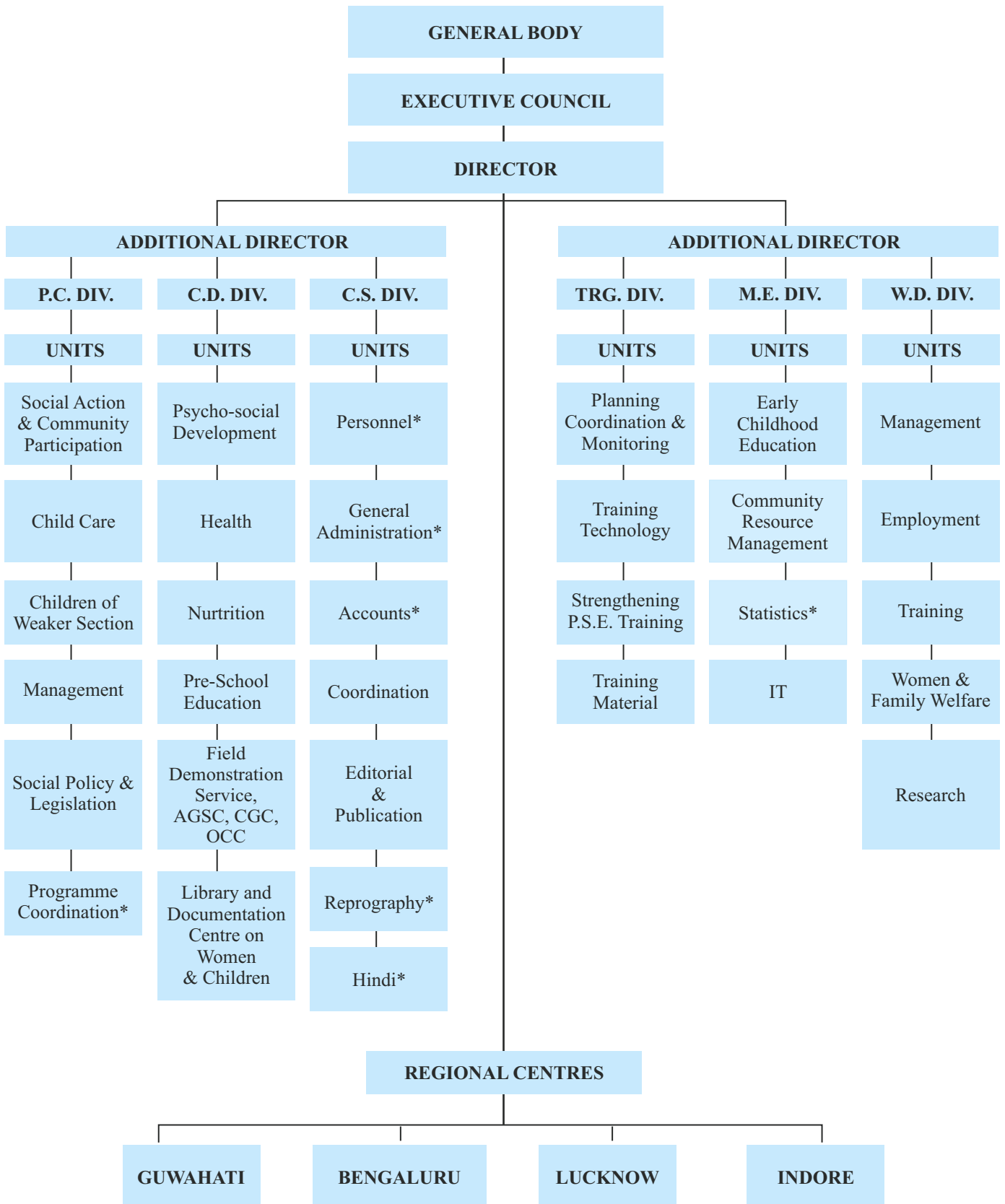

1. We have audited the attached financial statements of National Institute of Public Cooperation and Child Development (hereinafter referred to as Institute) which comprises the balance sheet as at 31st March, 2018 and also Income and Expenditure Account and Receipt and Payment Account for the year ended on that date annexed thereto.

Management Responsibility for the Financial Statements

2. The management of the Institute is responsible for the preparation of these financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position and financial performance of the Institute in accordance with the generally accepted accounting principles including Accounting Standards issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India. Their responsibility includes maintenance of adequate accounting records for safeguarding the assets of the Institute and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting policies, making judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent, design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal financial controls, that are operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

3. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We have conducted our audit in accordance with the Standards on Auditing issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES & NOTES FORMING PART OF THE ACCOUNTS

A. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. General

Basis of Preparation of Financial Statements

- (i) The financial statements have been prepared and presented under historical cost convention on accrual basis of accounting unless otherwise stated and on the accrual method of accounting on going concern basis.
- (ii) The accounts of the Institute are prepared as per proforma prescribed by the Government of India vide its letter dated 26th May, 1999 wherever applicable to that extent and as further amended by Sixty Eighth meeting of the Executive Council held on 09.02.2016 notified vide Office Order No.NI/Accts./II/5/2015-16 dated 31.03.2016.
- (iii) The Financial Statement includes the financial statements of Headquarter (Delhi) and Regional Centres at Guwahati, Bengaluru, Lucknow and Indore.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements requires the management to make estimates and assumptions considered in the reported amounts of assets and liabilities (including contingent liabilities) as of date of the financial statements and the reported income and expenses for the reporting period. Management believes that the estimates used in the preparation of the financial statements are prudent and reasonable.

2. Revenue Recognition

- (i) The Organization derives revenue primarily as Grant received from Ministry of Women and Child Welfare Grants of the nature of contribution towards capital expenditure (to the extent utilized in the year) are treated as of Capital Fund. Grants for meeting the revenue expenditure are treated as income of the year in which they are realized, except that they will be treated as accrued income where sanctions have been issued upto the last day of the year and there is reasonable certainty of collection and realization.
- (ii) Bank interests are accounted on receipt basis. Class Room and Hostel Charges, Fees received from ADCGC Students, Fee received for CGC & AGSC Services, Institutional Charges and Fees received from the participants as Registration Charges are treated as user charges of the Institute.
- (iii) The unspent balances of Grants, interest earned on Saving Bank Account and Miscellaneous Receipts are refundable to MWCD in the succeeding year, unless otherwise stated.
- (iv) Interest on investment of CPF/GPF Funds has been accounted on accrual basis.

3. Fixed Assets and Depreciation

- (i) Fixed Assets are stated at cost, less accumulated depreciation and impairment, if any. Costs

directly attributable to acquisition are capitalized until the assets are ready for use, as intended by the management.

- (ii) Assets acquired out of sponsored projects funds are treated as Institute's Assets.
- (iii) Assets received as Gratis from various agencies are treated as assets of the Institute and valued at cost, by corresponding credit to Capital Reserve.
- (iv) No assets have been revalued during the year.

(b) Depreciation

- (i) Depreciation on Fixed Assets is charged at the rates prescribed under Income tax Act, 1961 on written-down value method.
- (ii) Assets costing less than Rs.10,000/- and Books & Periodicals- Depreciation is charged at the rate of 100% since 2003-2004.
- (iii) Depreciation on various Fixed Assets received as Gratis is charged at the rate of 20% since 2003-2004 as decided by the Management.

4. Investment

Investments being of permanent nature are, carried at cost.

5. Employee Benefits

(i) Short Term Benefits

Short term benefits like salary, allowances expected to be paid in exchange for the services rendered by employees are recognized as an expense during the period when the employees render the services.

(ii) Defined Contribution Plan

The Institute's contribution to defined contribution schemes such as Contributory Provident Fund and New Pension Scheme are charged to the Income and Expenditure Account as and when incurred.

(iii) Defined Benefit Plan

The Institute also provides gratuity benefits to the employees, which is also charged from Grant received from the Govt. of India. As approved by the Executive Council in its Meeting held on 31st March, 2004, the liability in respect of gratuity, pension and leave encashment upto the year end is determined by actual valuation made by the Institute.

B. NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

1. During the financial year 2017-18, Ministry of Women and Child Development, Govt. of India has released grant for activities under following budget heads.

3. The Institute acknowledges the liability towards any expenditure at the time when it has been approved by the competent authority for payment and accordingly deducts TDS at that time. As such Institute has not deducted TDS on the provisions of expenditures made during the year 2017-18.
4. No liability of audit fee has been created during the year.
5. Accrued interest on advances Rs.3,15,120/- is not confirmed and un-reconciled.
6. Some fixed assets of the Institute have been revalued in the year 2003 & 2004, however the reconciliation of the revalued assets as per valuation report with books of accounts has been done during the year and the differences in the values of the assets have been adjusted accordingly along with the corresponding adjustments in Depreciation.
7. Rs.903.00 lakh has been paid to NBCC till 31st Mar 2018 for the construction of Building for Regional Centre Mohali, this is shown as deposit under the head loan and advances in the Balance Sheet instead of as Capital Work in Progress under the head Fixed Assets.
8. Central Project Support Unit (CPSU) of Rural Women's Development and Empowerment (Swa-Shakti) Project has been shifted to NIPCCD w.e.f. 01.07.2002. As per the agreement with Ministry of Women and Child Development the bank account related to CPSU would be maintained by the Institute. The Institute would release the funds to CPSU on receipt of funds from the Ministry of Women and Child Development, Govt. of India. Now the CPSU unit has been closed w.e.f. Dec.2005 and unspent balance of Rs.32,82,019.59 only lying in the Bank of CPSU which will be transferred to NIPCCD Account on close of Account on the receipt of approval from MWCD.
9. Rs. 1.82 lakh has been shown as "Suspense Account" in the Balance Sheet under the head Current Assets represents the amount misappropriated by a former cashier H.C. Changra and the matter is still subjudice.
10. The balances under Sundry Creditors (Schedule 3) and Sundry Debtors (Schedule 9) are mostly dues/receivable from govt. department which are pending for confirmation. Similarly the balances from Loans and Advances (Schedule 8) and Current Liability (Schedule 4) are not confirmed and are pending for approval of necessary adjustment from the concerned department.
11. Contingent Liability: An ex- employee of the Institute has filed a case in the Delhi High Court against his dismissal. Under directive issued by Hon'ble High Court of Delhi an amount of Rs.2.89 lakhs was deposited with the respective authorities shown as Deposit against Contingent Liability under Schedule 8 of Annual Accounts.
12. The Institute reduces the value of assets purchased from the Capital Grants received and treated as Capital Fund. However, to comply with instructions received from Ministry of HRD vide D.O. Letter No. 1703/JS & FA (HRD)/2/2002 dated 19th March, 2002 the Institute has started charging depreciation on cost of assets (Refer Accounting Policy No.3). The depreciation is not routed

through Income and Expenditure as the entire cost of assets has already been reduced from grant received by it in the year of purchase. The above is only for disclosure purpose and has been shown by way of deduction from assets (Schedule No.7 and 13) and from Capital Fund (Schedule 1 and 5).

13. The investment under CPF/GPF is made only in Government related securities and debt related securities. No investment is made by Institute in Equities as prescribed by Government of India.
14. Following obsolete, unserviceable and discarded assets were disposed off/written off during the year:

15. Taxation

In view of there being no income taxable under the Income Tax Act 1961, no provision for Income tax has been considered necessary.

16. The Institute account for the liability of retirement benefits on estimated basis every year and the provision for retirement benefits for the year 2017-18 is Rs.5,297.02 lakh.
17. Previous Year's figures have been re-grouped, re-casted and re-arranged wherever considered necessary.
18. Schedule '1' to Schedule '21' form an integral part of Balance Sheet and Income and Expenditure Account and Receipt & Payment Account and have been duly authenticated.
